

SOURCES FOR STORIES

E. Lovell Bennett delivered on a rural mail route around Barrington for forty-six years beginning in 1910. Bennett School, which was at Rand and Miller Roads, was named after his family. He was born in 1892.

Elmer Hartz was born in 1891, went to school near Deer Grove, and farmed all his life on farms around Barrington.

Hazel Adams Horn was born in 1905, and her grandparents were among the early settlers in this area in 1837. She is a descendant of Samuel Adams.

Elsie Krause Kirby lived with her family above their country store at Cuba Station northwest of Barrington. She has been talented in making quilts. She was born in 1896.

William H. Klingenberg was born north of Barrington in 1904. His grandfather, Johann Muller, settled in the area in 1856. William H. Klingenberg was one of the original directors of the Barrington Historical Society.

Garret H. Landwer came to Barrington from Germany in 1852 when he was six years old. He helped his father farm the prairie, became a carpenter, and in 1878, he opened a general store in Barrington.

Arnett C. Lines, born in 1882, was the resident historian of Barrington. He kept notes and records all of his adult life and from them wrote *A History of Barrington, Illinois*.

Jennie Lines, a sister of Arnett Lines, served as librarian when the library was over the Village Hall. Her grandfather, Millius B. McIntosh, was the first elected mayor. She was born in 1887.

Donald McDowell, whose grandparents were settlers here at the outbreak of the Civil War, now lives in California. He sent back a story told to him by his grandfather.

Robert Miller, born in 1900, lived on Miller Road, which was named for his family. The large slough on their farm there later became Lake Barrington.

Florence Eilers Robinson was born in 1896. Her grandparents, the Shufeldts, came to Barrington to farm in 1854, and her grandfather was a blacksmith.

Marvin Snyder, born in 1904, loved the stories of his grandfather, Ed Lamey, and wrote them down for the Barrington Historical Society along with his own memories of Barrington.

Sara Cowden Waterman lived on Penny Road near Barrington Center. Her grandfather was Deacon Nelson Messer of the Baptist Church. She was born in 1865.

May Whitney was born in Barrington in 1870. She taught at the old Honey Lake School, then married Joseph Whitney and moved to Lake Zurich.

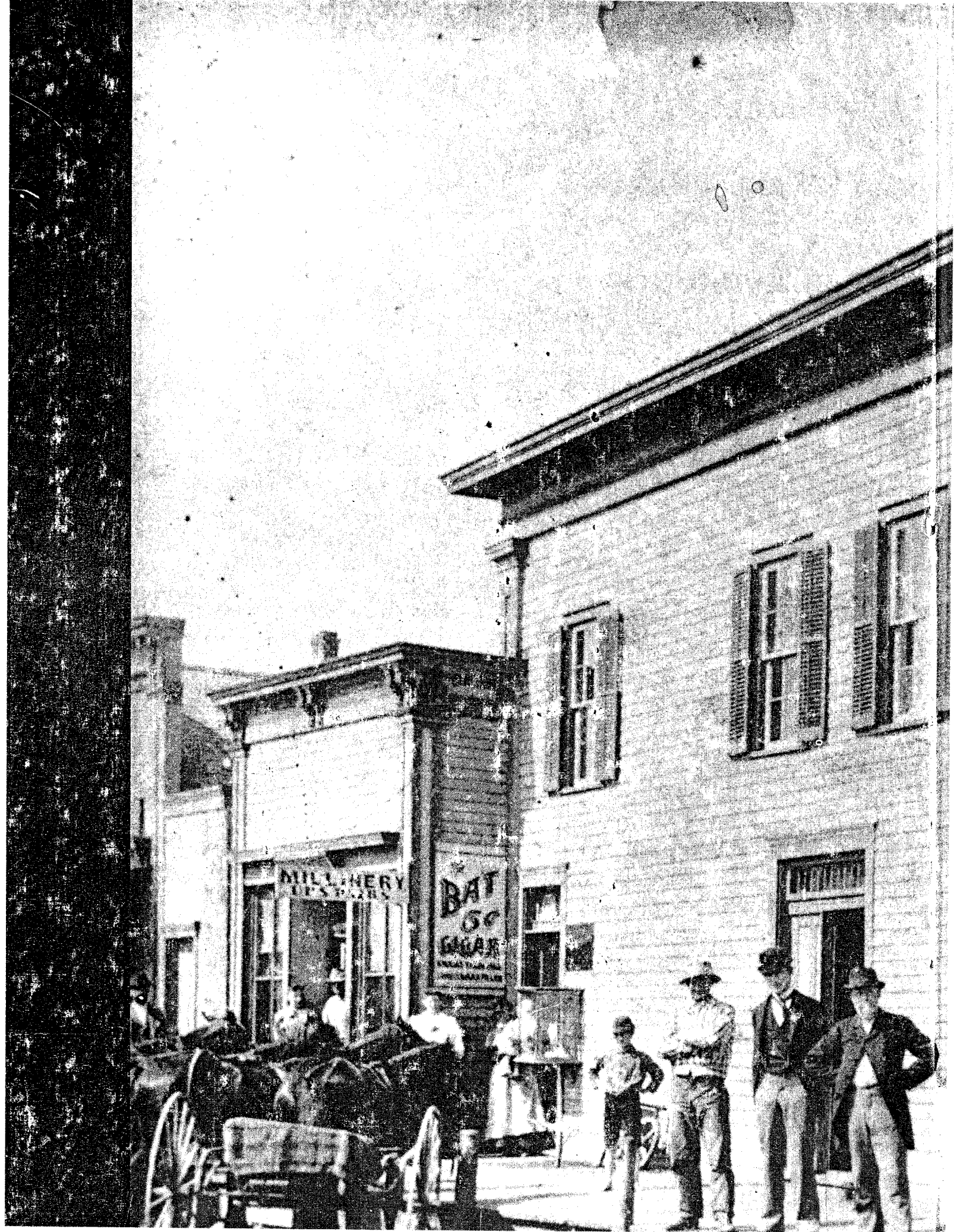
