STORIES FROM AN ERUPTION

"A fearful black cloud was rent by forked and quivering bursts of flame, and parted to reveal great tongues of fire... Darkness fell, not the dark of a moonless or cloudy night, but as if the lamp had been put out in a closed room. You could hear the shrieks of women, the wailing of infants and the shouting of men... Many besought the aid of the gods, but still more imagined there were no gods left, and that the universe was plunged into eternal darkness

Letter from Pliny the Younger to the historian Tacitus, A.D. 79

It began with a loud crack, followed by a sharp rumble moving across the plain from the nearby mountain. An enormous column of dark smoke and debris rose from the mountain's peak, growing to a height of tens of thousands of feet before it flattened and spread out against the sky, blotting out the sun. A few moments of calm, and then the "rains" came to Pompeii—first a shower and then a downpour of pumice, ash and red-hot boulders. Later that night, a powerful surge of super-heated volcanic gases, rocks and ash raced down the mountain, burying nearby Herculaneum and those who had sought shelter near the shore. They would remain buried for nearly 1,700 years.

"Pompeii: Stories from an Eruption" tells the story of the people who lost their lives and the vibrant society that was destroyed in the eruption of the world's most famous volcano, Mount Vesuvius. Through the things they carried as they fled, the works of art and everyday objects they left behind, and the heartbreaking casts of victims who were buried in the ashes, the exhibition brings to life real people from the ancient world. Valuable jewelry, coins and silver; brilliantly colored frescoes and mosaics; everyday objects from tools and keys to food abandoned on a table-all serve to tell the stories of people and society in the cities of Pompeii, Herculaneum and Oplontis. As they explore those stories, visitors will learn about the extraordinary events that led to the cities destruction and ensured their preservation, and they'll discover how archaeolo-

gists are using their finds to reconstruct the details of everyday life.

Reading the City

For the Roman empire in the first century, the area around the Bay of Naples was more than an outpost. One of the richest agricultural landscapes of the ancient world, it produced wine, olive oil and fish sauce for export as well as for its own use. Its ports served commercial and military activities. And its beautiful countryside and Mediterranean breezes lured the wealthy to build grand villas and gardens. Though an earthquake had flattened the area in A.D. 62, the people soon returned, pouring their savings into rebuilding homes and infrastructure, factories and shops. The marketplaces of Pompeii, the grand villas of Herculaneum and the country estates of Oplontis teemed with

The eruption of Vesuvius ended it all in just two days. But the hardened volcanic material preserved the cities as they were at that moment, nearly 2,000 years ago. Now in the ongoing excavations of Pom-



peii, Herculaneum and other nearby sites, archaeologists are reading a history not found in books

It has been said that there is no historical document like a city. University of Iowa archaeologist Glenn Storey, content advisor to the Field Museum on the exhibit, explains: "The Romans did a lot of writing about their times," he says, "but there were many things they didn't write about-things they didn't think would be important to history or that they simply took for granted." The volcano had no such historical agenda or blind spots; it immortalized slaves and children, graffiti and plumbing, side by side with generals, politicians and great art.

All these items have significance to historians, archaeologists and anthropologists today. For example, Storey says, preserved workshops and tools tell us how gems were polished and jewelry was made. Household items like keys, a mirror and an ink pot give us a window onto everyday life. Objects like these, along with wonderfully preserved frescoes and elegant statues from the buildings, set the background for the stories in the exhibi-

But at the center of the stories are people.

The Things They Carried

You may have seen photos of the casts. Made from the hollows left when the bodies of the victims disintegrated, they have become the "emblem" of Pompeii.

In person they are unforgettably poignant: individuals alone at the moment of death; couples and families desperately fleeing together; whole groups of refugees wiped out in an instant. The exhibition's 12 casts-including one of a 9410. You can also visit Field Museum's group of skeletons found in an arcade in interactive Web site at www.fieldmuseum. Herculaneum—show us real human be-

ings, not abstract historical figures. Faced with sudden catastrophe, they are caught in the act of doing just what we would be doing: trying desperately to survive; accepting the inevitability of death.

Though the casts are mute, the places where they were found and the objects found near them tell the stories of who they were, their station in life, what was important to them and what they did as disaster approached. They were climbing a staircase, running for the door, crouched against a wall, huddled with loved ones or strangers. They grabbed what they could, still thinking of a future. Their arms full, they dropped some of it as they ran.

A small fortune in jewelry, elegant silver cups and utensils and a hoard of coins lying near a young woman in the doorway of a sumptuous villa identifies her as the lady of the house; her companions in death, with meager belongings of their own, were her slaves perhaps. Not far from them, his back turned to the door, a man crouches and covers his face with his hands; a faithful dog waits by his side. In a gemstone-worker's shop, along with tools and unfinished work, a carbonized bed with a finely made headboard survives; beneath it, the skeleton of an adolescent boy who sought in vain to hide from the fiery surge. Elsewhere, we find evidence of optimism: a man clutches to his chest a small box holding the tools of his trade—a surgeon's instruments—hoping perhaps to aid his fellow refugees.

The familiar reactions of these distant people seem to bring them much closer to us. "The exhibition suggests many similarities between the ancient and modern worlds, not just in death but in life," Glenn Storey notes. "They're engaged in sports, politics, sending men to war. But how similar to us were the ancient Romans? Can we really know their mindset?"

"Pompeii" may not answer the question, but it offers food for thought.

Illinois Trade Secrets Act and Confidentiality Agreements

Illinois law provides protection for the wrongful use of confidential information under the Illinois Trade Secrets Act. A trade secret is generally defined as information that is sufficiently secret to derive economic value from not being generally known to other persons who can obtain economic value from its disclosure. In determining whether a trade secret exists, the court considers the extent to which the information is known outside of the employer's business; the extent to which the information is known by employees and others involved in the business; the



measures taken by the employer to guard the secrecy of the information: the value of the information to the employer and to his or her competitors; the amount of effort or money expended by the employer

in developing the information; and the ease or difficulty with which the information could be properly acquired or duplicated by others.

Recently, an Illinois Appellate Court considered whether an employer's customer list was considered a trade secret. In an action against a former employee. the court found that the employer's customer information was not a trade secret, because the employer failed to take "reasonable steps" to keep the information confidential. The court found that although electronic copies of customer information were provided to employees on a need-to-know basis, no other steps were taken to restrict any physical copies of the information. For example, there was no evidence that the employer advised their employees, verbally or in writing, that the information was confidential, and employees were not required to sign a confidentiality agreement. However, in another case, an employer's customer information was found to be protected as a trade secret because of the numerous security measures the employer undertook to protect the information; the employer kept offices locked; had special computer access codes for employees; limited cus- Area Professional Women.

tomer information to persons on a needto-know basis; kept hard copies of customer lists locked; kept salesmen's call books and customer cards locked; had security cameras; and required employees to sign confidentiality agreements that stated that the names of the employer's customers could not be used or disclosed because they belonged to the employer and were confidential.

Accordingly, both employees and employers should carefully consider the use and enforceability of a confidentiality agreement to protect confidential information in light of the security measures taken by the employer to protect the information. He is most famous for his testimony for the defense at the O.J. Simpson trial. Lee is the author of Cracking Cases: the Science of Solving Crimes and Cracking More Cases: The Forensic Science of Solving Crime. Tickets are \$10 for Harper students, faculty, staff and senior citizens; \$12 for general admission. All tickets on the day of show will be \$15.

Best-selling author T.C. Boyle will read and perform from his works at 7:30 p.m., Monday, April 10, in the Performing Arts Center. Formerly called T. Coraghessan Boyle, he "has transformed the nature of short fiction in our time," according to one critic. In a review of his short story collection, After the Plague, the New York Times hailed him as "a writer who can take you anywhere." His latest work, Tooth and Claw, is a collection of short stories published in GQ, Harper's and Playboy. Facial Plastic Surgery, Looking Your Best

Eyelid Surgery

"The eyes are the windows to the soul!" Eyes are one of the most expressive features we have and reveal a lot about us. Subtle changes in their appearance let people know if we are happy, sad, well rested, or tired. We are able to "read" people and at the same time be "read" by others through our eyes. Many have found that an energetic, youthful appearance can enhance others' perceptions of their performance at work. If their eyes look half closed due to excess upper eyelid skin or have "bags" beneath them because of excess fat bulging from beneath the lower eyelids, the overall appearance is one of tiredness and lack of energy. Even when they get plenty of sleep they can still look tired. Many people just feel younger than they look and would like to improve their overall appearance

These are some of the reasons that a large portion of the cosmetics industry is devoted to enhancing the appearance of our eyes; through makeup, anti-aging and rejuvenating creams. Cosmetic companies realize that a first step in improving our looks is to improve the look of our eyes.

How Do the Eyes Change as We Age?

The effects of aging are usually seen first in our eyes. As we get older the skin of the upper eyelid tends to increase and become redundant. This can hide the smooth skin just above the eyelashes where women wear eyeshadow. If enough excessive skin forms, it can actually hang over the eyelashes and obstruct vision. There can also be bulging of fat from behind the eyelid, causing a fullness or discreet bulge in the middle corner of the evelid.

In the lower eyelids the first sign of aging normally seen is a bulging of the orbital fat creating the puffiness most people refer to as "bags". This is caused by a relaxation of the septum, a membrane beneath the eyelid muscles, which allows the fat of the eyesocket to bulge out beneath the skin. This relaxation is a normal consequence of aging but can occur in young people as a family trait. As pressure is applied to the closed eye one can see this bulge increase. Excess skin of the lower eyelid can also form but not usually to the same degree as in the up-

What Can Surgery Accomplish?

In the upper eyelid excess skin is re-

opens this results in a normal crease approximately 7mm above the lash line. Excess fat, if present, is removed with the skin to reduce the fullness of the upper eyelid. The incision line is closed precisely at the crease to hide it during the healing process. Eyelid skin heals very rapidly. Special techniques are used in Asian eyes and selected others to create a more prominent crease.

In the lower eyelid an incision is made just beneath the lashes or in selected patients on the inside of the lower evelid. The excess fat, which is contained in three separate compartments, is then removed. Any excess skin is removed taking care not to place too much tension on the lower evelid.

An upper and lower blepharoplasty can be performed together or in combination with other facial rejuvenation procedures such as a facelift or rhinoplasty. The evelids can also be improved in certain individuals with chemical peeling and/or brow lifting. The need for these are determined at the preoperative consultation.

Where is Surgery Performed?

Eyelid surgery is most often performed in our office surgical suite, however if preferred, surgery can be performed at a number of different hospitals or ambulatory surgery centers in the area.

What is the Recovery Period?

Dissolving sutures are used in the lower eyelids and do not have to be removed. Nonabsorbing sutures are normally used in the upper eyelids and are removed on the fifth postoperative day. Makeup can be worn the day following suture removal and most people return to work at this time. There can be swelling of the eyes for one to two days following the operation which might interfere with vision so we recommend not driving until the swelling is down. After this most people can easily be out in public with sunglasses. Any bruising that occurs fades in moved to allow a smooth contour when the first 7 to 10 days. 


Prairie-Style and Arts-and-Crafts Period to be Discussed

Frank Lloyd Wright revolutionized American residential architecture during the early 20th century when he turned away from the prevailing Victorian style and introduced open floor plans, horizontal lines and homes that complemented their natural surroundings. Wright popularized what came to be known as the "prairie-style," based on the title of an article he wrote for the Ladies Home Journal in 1901.

The Chicago Arts and Crafts Movement, founded in 1897, flourished during the ascension of the Prairie School of Art and Architecture. But several factors influenced the artists and craftsman working in and around Chicago at this time. Many captured the cleaner, less-confining lines identified with the prairie-style, but other influences also prevailed, ranging from the Gothic to the Japanese tradition.

For the second topic of the Seminar Series sponsored by the Barrington/Northwest Community Associates of the Art Institute of Chicago, the lecture will focus on the overlapping styles evident in the arts and crafts during this vibrant period. On Thursday, Feb. 16, Jane Clarke will present a program titled "Arts and Crafts in Chicago: From Hull House to Ragdale." Jane Clarke has been a member of the Art Institute's Department of Museum Education since 1971. In 1988, she became asso-

ciate director of the department in charge of a division now called communications. Her responsibilities included administrative work and editing all museum education publications. Although recently retired, she continues to lecture for the Education Department and works as a free-lance editor.



Gum Recession—What Does it Mean?

Exposed roots are the result of gum recession, not the natural aging process There are many factors that contribute to a receding gumline. First, receding gums may be caused by bone loss beneath the gums, which cannot be seen. The supporting bone of the tooth could be deteriorating without the patient realizing it. 



A Gray Area

One of the greatest challenges in dentistry is finding materials that can withstand the forces generated in the mouth. In the past, gold has been the material that combined biocompatibility with strength. It is still the standard by which all new materials are measured

But what do we do when we have to crown a front tooth? Decades ago, gold was used on the front teeth. But as you can imagine, their appearance was far from satisfactory. Technicians started to experiment with different plastics and porcelains to cover the gold and create a crown that was white in appearance. This is the system that is most frequently used today when making tooth-colored crowns. The drawback to this system has always been the opacity of the crown. Light cannot be transmitted through the restoration because of the gold substructure, and this resulted in teeth that looked like Chiclets. Another problem is the appearance of this gold at the gumline. When someone smiles and you see a gray area at the margin where the crown ends and the gums begin, you're looking at unpolished gold that appears to be gray. In some instances, this grayness will radiate into the gum tissue because the metal used under the porcelain was not gold but a cheaper substitute. The molecules of the cheaper metal are leached into the gum tissue creating a gray tattoo.



gray appearance and the opacity. Unfortunately, many of them have fallen short on the durability scale and resulted in fractured porcelain. That is, until now. A company from Europe produces a white substructure that is just as strong as gold without the undesirable appearance. The substructure is fabricated in a central lab using digitized information e-mailed to them using the dentist's impression. The substructure then has porcelain applied to it just like the gold ones do. The result is a natural-looking crown that doesn't show any gray at the gumline.





Investment Strategies for Higher Oil Prices

Many investors are worried about the effects of higher fuel prices on the value of their investments. But high prices at the pump shouldn't prompt you to make big changes to your long-term investment

Though rising oil prices can contribute to an economic slowdown that sends stock prices lower, those negative results are not inevitable. Consulting Group examined the 10 largest average monthly oil price increases from 1970 through July 2005 and found that the relationship between oil prices and stock prices is somewhat unpredictable. For example, in January 1974, oil prices soared nearly 135%. However, the S&P 500 fell only 1%. In 1986, oil and stock prices moved in lockstep, rising 30.4% and 7.1% respectively. In fact, stocks gained 60% of the time oil prices rose.

It's likely that recent high gas prices

have left you with less money to spend elsewhere. And because consumer spending accounts for two-thirds of U.S. Gross Domestic Product growth, a weakened consumer can dampen corporate profits and pull down the economy.

But gas prices have not been prohibitively high. When we factor in inflation, the price of gas today is significantly less than it was back in 1981. In fact, oil prices would have to hit approximately \$90 per barrel-well above the current price-to match their previous inflation adjusted highs from 1980.

There are also several key differences between today's economy and that of the 1970s. Oil consumption as a percentage of U.S. GDP recently stood at 4.1%, down from 8.5% in the early 1980s, according to the Department of Energy. Inflation today is extremely low by historical standards compared to the double-digit levels of the




Form, Function—Fabulous!
