

Almsgiving 2010 Results

Faithjustice thanks parishioners for their almsgiving in this fourth year of our five year effort in the Democratic Republic of Congo. We knew this would be a difficult year following so closely on the heels of the Haitian earthquake. (That collection totaled more than \$38,000.) Together these two efforts say a great deal about the concern of the St. Anne Catholic Community for those who live in two of the world's poorest countries.

We are most grateful for the amount we have collected for our ongoing work in Rugari Parish. Our decision to work directly with the Diocese of Goma and a rural parish has made it possible for 100% of our funds to go into specific projects. With the amount collected to date, we hope to be able to meet one, and perhaps part of a second goal of the four we had hoped to accomplish this year. The choice of projects will be brought to the people of Notre Dame du Rosaire Parish in just a few weeks. Jackie Griffin will be travelling to Goma for a five week stay at the end of the month. She will deliver our funds and help with the discernment of how this year's alms will be used. Faithjustice will keep you posted on the results of their meeting.

2011 Trip Planned

Members of the Faithjustice Committee will be travelling to Goma sometime next year. Rugari Parish celebrates their 125th anniversary in 2011, and Abbe Romaine and Edouard Ntamabyaliro have invited all from St. Anne who are able to travel to Africa to participate in what will be great festivities. While there, we will also work on a number of short-term projects. The dates and details will be worked out over the course of this summer and will be shared as soon as they are known.

THE LORD'S PRAYER

April 12th-17th

"Lord, teach us to pray..."
The Gospel according to Luke 11:1

As we continue the celebration of Jesus' resurrection, at this month's **Generations of Faith** event, we focus on the words Jesus taught us to pray. Jesus taught his disciples what we call the *Lord's Prayer* or the *Our Father*. Most of us learned these words as children. We say them every week at Mass; many of us say them every day. Why did Jesus use these words to answer his disciples? What do they really mean? For what are we asking when we pray the *Lord's Prayer*? Please join us as we explore these questions.

Adults: Please take note...

The Monday night session will follow the usual format with breakout sessions for high school students and adults. We are pleased to welcome two dynamic speakers on Monday: **Fr. Richard Fragomeni** will present to the adults, and **Fr. Matt Eyerman** will present to the teens. Fr. Fragomeni will also present to the adults at the Wednesday session. **Adults desiring a formal presentation by a learned theologian should attend either the Monday or Wednesday session.**

This session will afford households the ability to learn together. While there will be a pre-school breakout, all other participants should select two 30-minute activity centers from the following choices on Tuesday through Saturday:

IMAGING THE WORD

Tuesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday

(This activity center will be replaced by Fr. Fragomeni's presentation at the Wednesday session).

Read Matthew's passage of the *Lord's Prayer*, listen to a sample reflection and then do a self-reflection on Matthew's passage (not recommended for younger children).

PRAYING WITH MOVEMENT

Explore the *Lord's Prayer* with physical gestures. Watch the *Lord's Prayer* being prayed in sign language, and then join your household or small group in creating your own gestures for each phrase of the *Lord's Prayer*.

SEVEN LITTLE WORDS

Explore and better understand the phrase "give us this day our daily bread." Discuss your understanding of "bread" as used in the phrase, and then reflect on Jesus' description of himself as "living bread." Discuss with your household or small group how you can be "bread" for others.

OUR PART IN THE KINGDOM

Explore how we are called to live the kingdom for which we pray. Discuss your definition of kingdom. Read three short Scripture passages that Jesus used to describe God's kingdom and discuss which you liked the best. With your household or small group, either use words to describe your part in the kingdom of God or do a drawing of what your family or group would look like if you embraced the kingdom of God.

Results of Audit Review of Saint Anne Parish Internal Controls for July 2008–June 2009

In September 2009, the Archdiocese engaged an examiner from an independent accounting firm to inspect the internal control environment and to assess the overall effectiveness of business operations at St. Anne Parish. Such reviews are customarily conducted after a new pastor is assigned to a parish, and consist of an examination of the administration of bank accounts (both operating and auxiliary group accounts), the accounting system, the financial reporting, the activities of the Finance Council, the processing of cash receipts and disbursements, and the associated regulatory issues.

In late October, the results of this assessment were shared with members of the Parish Staff, Parish Council Ministry, Finance Committee and School Board. The results at the conclusion of fieldwork document recommendations made to better safeguard assets, ensure the reliability of the accounting data, and comply with Archdiocesan "Best Practices." The recommendations from the September audit were based on these key findings:

- Insufficient oversight and control over the administration of parish bank accounts
- Deficiencies in adherence to published Archdiocesan Best Practices regarding cash receipts
- Lack of detailed deposit and disbursement activity in the parish financial records
- Lack of documentation and evidence of approval to support expense disbursements
- Lack of a defined process for payment of parish operating expenses
- Inadequate segregation of duties related to financial transactions

Our immediate implementation of the Archdiocesan Best Practices has strengthened the parish's internal controls and business practices. The examiner indicated that substantial progress had been made in incorporating Archdiocesan policies, guidelines, and Best Practices into the overall business operation since July 1, 2009, and was pleased to observe that almost all of the key recommendations were either in the planning phase or completed by the time the examination of internal controls took place.

While significant progress has been made, further opportunities for implementing Best Practices and enhancing operations still exist. Expanding the involvement of the Parish Finance Council, to assist in a number of areas of the administration of Saint Anne parish finances, will bring expertise to the key issues and areas of emphasis identified in the report. No doubt, there are many things beyond the review that will be improved parish-wide in the years to come.

Implementation of the Archdiocesan Best Practices in the business office operation will continue to maximize transparency and accountability of the parish finances. It will ensure that the generous gifts of the people of Saint Anne are properly recorded and safeguarded.

We are dedicated to the belief in staying current with the requirements embodied within the mandated Best Practices of the Archdiocese and will continue to work with our Vicariate Administrative Consultant to implement the audit recommendations.

A review of the book is as follows: *Mackenzie Allen Philips' youngest daughter, Missy, has been abducted during a family vacation and evidence that she may have been brutally murdered is found in an abandoned shack deep in the Oregon wilderness. Four years later, in the midst of his great sadness, Mack receives a suspicious note, apparently from God, inviting him back to that shack for a weekend. Against his better judgment, he arrives at the shack on a wintry afternoon and walks back into his darkest nightmare. What he finds there will change Mack's world forever.*

In a world where religion seems to grow increasingly irrelevant, "The Shack" wrestles with the timeless question, "Where is God in a world so filled with unspeakable pain?" The answers Mack gets will astound you and perhaps transform you as much as it did him.

William P. Young was born a Canadian and raised among a stone-age tribe by his missionary parents in the highlands of what was New Guinea. He suffered great loss as a child and young adult, and now enjoys the 'wastefulness of grace' with his family in the Pacific Northwest.



OUR FATHER

Over ten years ago, I wrote an article entitled "More Than Words" for this spirituality column. As we contemplate the **Our Father** in our Generations of Faith series this coming week, I thought that it was quite appropriate to repeat the material for this week's publication. Here is the article...

A couple of years ago, *Pastoral Life Magazine* presented a feature article about a prayer-master who advised his listeners to pray the **Our Father** with a good deal of thought. This prayer is only forty-four words, but it is a prayer that reminds us that we cannot ask God for things or privileges without an awareness of how we must reciprocate with a lifestyle that believes and proclaims the Gospel in everyday living. Hopefully, the following material that was printed on a prayer card and left in a little country church will explain this.

I cannot say 'our' if I live only for myself.

I cannot say 'Father' if I do not approach God like a child.

I cannot say 'who art in heaven' if I am not laying up some treasure there right now.

I cannot say 'hallowed be thy name' if I am careless with that name.

I cannot say 'thy kingdom come' if I am not working to actualize it is the here and now.

I cannot say 'thy will be done' if I am resentful of that will for me at this moment.

I cannot say 'on earth as it is in heaven' if I don't look on heaven as my future home.

I cannot say 'give us our daily bread' if I am overanxious about tomorrow.

I cannot say 'forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us' if I am waiting to settle a score with someone.

I cannot say 'lead us not into temptation' if I deliberately put myself in place to be tempted.

I cannot say 'deliver us from evil' if I am not prepared to pray as though everything depends on God and work as though everything depends on me.

I cannot say 'Amen' to this prayer if my whole life is not an "Amen" to what God has done and is doing in the events and circumstances of each day.



The Weekly Article from Ronald Rolheiser

THE RESURRECTION OF JESUS AND PHYSICAL CREATION

Pierre Teilhard de Chardin was once asked by a critic why he so often mentioned atoms and molecules when he talked about Jesus. His answer: I am trying to formulate a Christology that is large enough to incorporate the full Christ because Christ is not just an anthropological event but a cosmic phenomenon as well.

What does he mean by this? Essentially that Christ came into the world, not just to save human beings and reshape human history, but to save and reshape the earth as well.

Christ came to save the world, not just the people living in it. We see the deep proof of this in the resurrection. Jesus was raised from death to life. A dead body was resurrected and that, clearly, has a dimension that goes beyond the mere psychological and spiritual. There is something radically physical in the resurrection. Simply put, when a dead body is raised to new life, the physical structure of the universe is being altered, atoms and molecules are being rearranged. Thus, Jesus' resurrection is about more than simply new hope being born inside of human consciousness. It is also about a change in our planet.

Granted, the resurrection is about human hope. Without belief in the resurrection, there is no horizon and no promise beyond the asphyxiating confines of this life. The resurrection opens us to possibilities beyond this life. It gives us a meta-future. But it gives a meta-future to the world, our planet, as well. Christ came to save the earth, not just those of us who live on it, and his resurrection is also about the future of this planet.

The earth, too, needs saving. How? From what? For what?

If we take scripture seriously, we see that the earth is not just a stage upon which human beings get to work and play, something that has value only in relationship to us. Like humanity, it, too, is God's work of art, God's child. Indeed it is the matrix, the mother, the womb, from which we all spring. Ultimately we, human persons, are only that part of God's creation that has become self-conscious, and we do not stand apart from the earth and it does not exist simply for our benefit, like a stage for the actor, to be abandoned once the play is over. Physical creation has value in itself, independent of us.

Scripture challenges us to recognize this, and not just so that we can insure ourselves a continued supply of air,

water, and food by better safeguarding the integrity of creation. Scripture asks us to recognize the intrinsic value of the earth itself. It has value in itself, apart from us, and it is destined to share eternity with us. It, too, will go to heaven.

Moreover, like us, it is also time-bound, mortal, subject to decay, dying. Outside of an intervention from the outside, it has no future. Science clearly teaches this. The laws of entropy tell us that the universe is running down, the sun is burning out, and all energy is finite. The earth's days are numbered, counted. It will take millions of years, but finitude is finitude. There will be an end to the earth as we know it. Like us, it too will die. Outside of something being offered to it from the outside, it has no ultimate future.

This is what St. Paul refers in the Epistle to the Romans when he tells us that creation, the physical cosmos, is subject to futility and, like humanity itself, is groaning and longing to be set free from its bondage to decay so as to enjoy the glorious liberty of the children of God. The Epistle to the Romans assures us that earth, our planet, will enjoy the same future as we will. In the resurrection, it too is given a new possibility, transformation and an eternal future.

But what will this look like? How will the earth be redeemed? It will be redeemed in just the same way that we are, through the resurrection of Jesus. The resurrection brought into our world a new power, a new arrangement of things, a new hope, and something so radically novel that it can only be compared to what happened at the initial creation when our universe first started. At the dawn of creation, the atoms and molecules of this universe were made out of nothing, *ex nihilo*; nature took shape, and its reality and physical laws held sway from then on - until the resurrection of Jesus. Something new happened then, radically new, and that event (which in its core contained a radically physical component) touched every aspect of the universe, from the soul and psyche inside of every man and woman to the inner make-up inside of every atom and molecule.

In the resurrection of Jesus, the very atoms of the universe were rearranged. The laws of physics were somehow stunningly altered and because of that, our planet now too has the possibility of eternal life.

It is important to keep in mind that the whole Easter season, from the great Easter Vigil of Holy Saturday night through the Feast of Pentecost, is the time of mystagogia—the term the catechumenalⁱ community appropriately uses to highlight that the whole Church is celebrating its new life in Christ by dwelling in this life and reflecting on its meaning. The scripture readings are key to understanding just how that new life is shared with us by God and makes clear as well the demands placed on us.

These stories proclaim the uniqueness of the death and rising of the Christ and should be viewed from the perspective of our own dying to sin and rising to new life. After all, it was we who just recalled our own passage from darkness to light, from obscure meanderings to certain pathway, as we renewed our baptismal promises to *reject sin so as to live in the freedom of God's children*.ⁱⁱ It was we who were led by the great Easter Candle, while singing, *Christ Our Light*. We saw and heard the waters of the Baptismal font blessed for use. We smelled the sweet chrism used to anoint the foreheads of the Elect as they were confirmed; we heard Paul speak *that just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might live in the newness of life*.

Over these next seven weeks, we will journey into the unpacking of that mystery of how, after that resurrection of some 2000 years ago, the Lord is present in our lives in such a way that we sense that we are empowered to do the mission on which God has sent us.

Once again, we are tempted to stay with the miraculous spoken dramatically in the today's gospel. But let's look closely at the lesson. John's community is distraught:ⁱⁱⁱ it is almost three generations since Jesus was physically present; the Temple is destroyed, the Jews dispersed. As the Jews struggled to reconstruct themselves, they expel from their midst John's community for insisting that Jesus **was** the Christ, the long-awaited One. So John recognizes that they are in fear. What is there to look to? *Peace be with you*, John's Jesus says.^{iv} Thomas came to believe after seeing Jesus face to face and seeing the wounds. But Jesus says, *[b]lessed are those who have not seen and have believed*. *Peace*, John's Jesus says again. And John continues: *these [signs] are written that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that through this belief you may have life in his name*. And so it is: over these next weeks, all the words of witness that we will hear spoken are specifically to us so that even at this great distance from the physical Jesus, we can still have life. This process of unpacking what we started at the Vigil and the first Sunday of Easter, this mystagogy, is the unraveling of a mystery. It is about how can we find hope in the Jesus who no longer walks among us. It is how we can find hope, and peace, in dark moments of life—whether individually, or as a church community. Consider the current dark times: the pain we are undergoing resulting from the mishandling of the many cases of sexual abuse of children and the apparent lack of transparency and accountability by our pastoral leaders.

So What? Today's gospel pericope^v ends at v.31 with an assurance that we have come to believe in order that we might have life. What are we to do something with this "life"? Maybe there is a hint for us if we connect John's story with the story in The Acts of the Apostles (First Reading, vv.12 and 16) about the Christ's followers curing the sick. Or is it possible that somehow we have inherited the notion that only those sent by the original apostles (they, and those whom they have designated as priests) have the "authority" to bring about cure; one week after the Triduum^{vi} have we somehow already forgotten that it is God who is God?

Pray/reflect on the psalm refrain for this Sunday:

Give thanks to the Lord, for he is good, his love is everlasting.


