Campout Attendance Reminder:


Just a couple of reminders on campout protocol: When a Scout is registered for a campout, we expect them to remain for the entire campout, from the assembly point at the middle school to the final dismissal at the campsite.

If there are special circumstances that make it impossible for a Scout to attend the entire campout, these must be discussed with their patrol leader (to ensure that they can plan for the correct number of Scouts at each meal) and with Mr. T., our Activities Chair (to be sure that our tour permit and our transportation arrangements are in order).

For tracking of Scout attendance for advancement purposes, even if there are special circumstances that prevent a Scout from attending an entire campout, the Scout must, at a minimum, spend at least one night and participate, to at least some extent, in the activity of the campout to receive credit for attendance at that campout.

TROOP 10 Training

The district training schedule is not out yet for the second half of the Scout season but I am told that the three safety courses. I.e., **Climb on Safety, Safe Swim Defense and, Safety Afloat**, will be taught at the **Merit Badge Clinic** which is scheduled for **March 2nd**. This will be a good opportunity for those wishing to complete that training. In the mean time, the only scheduled training event is as follows:

- **CLIMBING/RAPPELLING INSTRUCTOR TRAINING:** This course will require a one day ground training session at the BSA Council Office and then a two day weekend training session at Camp Napowan during the summer. Requirements for full instructor certification are as follows:
 1. Current BSA Class 2 or 3 Medical Record
 2. Current First Aid/CPR Certification
 3. 18 years of age or older
 4. Completion of one classroom session followed by one two-day outdoor session

When: Attend any one: Tuesday, April 23; Wednesday, May 22; Tuesday, June 25;
Time: 6:30 p.m. – 9:30 p.m.
Where: Northwest Suburban Council Office, 600 N. Wheeling Road, Mt. Prospect

OUTDOOR SESSION:

When: Attend any one: Saturday and Sunday, June 15 & 16; July 6 & 7; July 13 & 14; August 10 & 11;
Time: 9 a.m. – 4 p.m.
Where: Camp Napowan Adventure Base Climbing Tower.
Cost: \$50 (includes course materials and meals)

February, 8, 9, and 10, 2002 - Devils Head/Cabin Campout






**NOTE TO PARENTS OF LIFE SCOUTS

This past year we have been working with many boys on their Eagle Projects. We need all parents to remember that the rank of Eagle is the pinnacle of your son's Scouting career and that the boy must earn the rank. One of the biggest challenges for the boy is his Eagle Project. As parents we need to support our sons as they work on their project, but we must also remember that the project is the boy's to do. This involves all planning from the beginning through the execution of the project. To that end, the Eagle Coordinators will not work with parents on their sons' Eagle project. Our job is to assist the boys with the development of the project and serve as a guide to them. So be supportive of their efforts, but don't do the project for them. We all want to see them succeed but as stated before the boy must **earn** the rank of Eagle by completing all of the necessary requirements.

Advancement Participation Requirements

One of the requirements for advancement for all ranks in Scouting is that the Scout seeking to advance must be an active member of the troop. Generally, in Troop 10 that means that you are an active participant at 60% of the troop meetings and at 60% of the campouts. It is very important that Scouts seeking to advance in rank do their best to be active members and participate in

these activities. If a Scout is seeking to advance but has not been able to maintain his participation, that Scout may need to defer that advancement until he can bring up his active participation in our Troop 10 activities. If you have any questions on these guidelines, please contact our advancement chair people or your Scoutmaster.

1. Be a registered Scouter
2. Have completed Fast start and New Leader Essentials
3. Have completed Position Specifics Training for your registered position
4. Have a Class 3 physical valid through September 2002 (Class 3

is the same type of physical that is required to stay 3 or more days camping at Napowan)

Campout Attendance Reminder:

For tracking of Scout attendance for advancement purposes, even if there are special circumstances that prevent a Scout from attending an entire campout, the Scout must at a minimum spend at least one night and participate to at least some extent in the activity of the campout to receive credit for attendance at that campout.

These course offerings are as follows:

SCOUT MASTER / ASSISTANT SCOUT MASTER SPECIFICS

(This is part 2 of being considered "trained". This course typically follows the New Leader Essentials training course and comes before Outdoor Leader Skills. Note that these sessions can be taken in any order):

Wormy's Corner

I have always felt that if a Scout eats well on a campout or trek, things like questionable weather, bugs and forgotten gear are more tolerable. To that end, we have always strived to make Troop 10 the best fed troop on the planet. I have been asked to contribute some of my meal ideas each month. You can copy them into a notebook, cut them out and file them...or toss'em, but hopefully, as time goes on, I'll be able to turn your camping menu into something you look forward to eating.

Starting a new year, facing many months of camping and hiking, I thought a recipe for good old Beef Jerky might be in order (the stuff you buy in the gas stations is incredibly expensive and doesn't taste very good). Jerky can be eaten as a snack, ground up and mixed with dried fruit (the old Indian "Pemmican"), cooked in stew, or you can make up a recipe.

You will need:

2 lbs. lean meat (round, chuck, sirloin)

1/2 cup Worcestershire sauce

1/2 cup soy sauce

1 tsp. each, crushed garlic, red pepper, black pepper, salt

This makes a great marinade, but you can also use any bottled marinade to make it simple. Partially freeze the meat (easier to slice) and slice into thin strips across the grain. Mix Worcestershire sauce, soy sauce and garlic. Rub meat with salt and pepper. Place meat into marinade and store in the fridge for 24 hours. Pat meat dry and dehydrate in oven set at 150 degrees for 7-8 hours. Place the meat strips onto the rack and place foil underneath. Leave the door of the oven partially open for air circulation. Be patient. Try a piece. If it cracks in two when you bend it, it's ready.

After it cools, place it into Zip-Loc freezer bags (tougher than regular bags for stuffing into your pack). This recipe yields about 1/2 lb. jerky and will keep for several weeks.


