MINUTES of 7-11-66: approved on MOTION by Trustee Wyatt; 2nd Trustee Hollister.Ayes. * Trustee Capulli not voting due to absence that meeting.

STATEWIDE INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT CONF. President distributed copies of transcript of proceedings of 5-12-66.

JOBS'S DAUGHTERS requested permission to hold an ice cream social 8-20-66 in Jewel Shopping Center which is private property. Village Clerk asked to notify them the Village Board did not object.

INQUIRIES INVITED FROM AUDIENCE: Dick Leibach of 734 Grove Ave. asked for permission to close his block of Grove Ave. 8-28-66 from 1 to 6 P.M. for a <u>block picnic</u>, having received approval from majority of residents. Chief of Police stated similar affairs have been held in past. President suggested perhaps school grounds available. MOTION Trustee Capulli that permission be granted;2nd Trustee Hollister. Ayes.

JUNIOR COLLEGE: Joseph H. Mueller, R2, Box 409, Barrington P.O., presented matter of petition on behalf of Barrington High School Board in connection with the Lake County project; they would appreciate a Resolution from Village Board opposing same. He explained in great detail pros and cons on subject stating that an Advisory Committee appointed to study both proposed junior college districts feels district should be kept together as a whole and best prospects would be to join by annexation to Dist.512 Palatine-Arlington Heights, which proposes to build on site at Roselle Rd. & Algonquin Rds. Lake County would build in center of county at about Rtes. 120 & 45. Trustee Voss read a proposed Resolution; one change made in line 2 of Par. 3 on Page 1 from 'district' to 'Board'. Trustees felt this a worthwhile matter and that school board should be supported. MOTION Trustee Wyatt to adopt Resolution; 2nd Trustee Voss. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, Shultz, Wyatt, Voss, Hollister. MOTION Trustee Voss that Village Clerk be authorized to certify copy of Resolution and forward same to Mr. Mueller for presentation to correct authorities; 2nd Trustee Hollister. Ayes. Mr. James Dow, President Barrington High School Board thanked the Trustees for their cooperation. Mr. Mueller stated it would be of further help if Village could be represented 8-17-66 at 7.30 PM, Mundelein High School.

<u>MR. SAM SHERMAN - WALTON ST.(220 Bradwell Rd.)</u> presented problem of plan previously approved for construction of multiple dwelling on his property with architect sketch showing if building placed as approved it would be at center of Walton St. since it was planned for 138' and lot is 125'; he has additional R10 property adjacent and has drawn new plan for 2-10 unit buildings. Trustee Capulli suggested this matter be referred to Plan Commission for complete study and clarification for all. Mr. Sherman stated he has already granted easement for storm sewer now under contract and this would not be disturbed; his plan would improve entire area. Discussion had. MOTION Trustee Wyatt that this matter be forwarded to the Plan Commission in accordance with the law, subject to receipt of proper documents and fee of \$50.;2nd Trustee Hollister. Ayes.

BARRINGTON REST HOME PETITION: Report from Zoning Board of Appeals read:"...it was unanimously voted to recommend that you grant the petition." Discussion had on ordinance to cover variation for occupancy by nurses. MOTION Trustee Capulli to concur with recommendation of the Zoning Board of Appeals for variation in the use of 142 W. Station Street.; 2nd Trustee Hollister. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, Shultz, Wyatt, Voss, Hollister.

<u>M. J. GRAFT PETITION</u>: Report from Zoning Board of Appeals on petition heard requesting redivision of 2 lots at Exmoor & Roslyn Rd. read: "....it was the unanimous vote that we recommend you grant the petition." MOTION Trustee Wyatt to concur in recommendation of the Zoning Board of Appeals; 2nd Trustee Voss. Roll call-Ayes:Capulli, Shultz,Wyatt,Voss,Hollister. Village Manager Gaffigan asked that it be clarified that the Building Dept. should not act until above required ordinance has been passed by the Village Board. Agreed.

ILL. LIQUOR COMMISSION HEARING (Ten Pin): President stated he had testified; no report on decision yet received.

STATE SALES TAX FOR APRIL 1965 reported as gross to Village: \$9716.77.

FIRST NATIONAL BANK & TRUST CO. OF BARRINGTON June Statement received & filed.

NORSTROM-HILGERS PETITION FOR REZONING: received in triplicate with plat & fee; request rezoning of lots 5, 6 & 7 in Block 11 in Arthur T. McIntosh & Co. Northwest Highway Addition to Barrington, from R-7 single family to B-1 for purpose of constructing & maintaining a 1-story professional office building. MOTION Trustee Capulli that this be referred to Plan Commission for hearing, if all papers in order; 2nd Trustee Shultz. Ayes.

SPRUCE RD. (Jewel Park): State San. Water Board approval received for sanitary sewer extension #1966-HB-365.SWB Log #582-66. Mr. Schlachter stated he had presented 2 changes for his documents already filed & asked what became of his objections. President advised that Attorney, at last meeting, had stated Mr. Schlachter had not filed formal objections. Trustee Wyatt stated copies were distributed to Trusttes and he did not know of any action the Board could take. President stated Board has approved plats on street and subdivision but linens have not yet been received for signatures. Mr. Schlachter stated if he has to go to court he will, following which statement he left meeting. Attorney Kreger read letter received by Attorneys from LaSalle National Bank re Mr. Schlachter's status as their agent, copy of which was requested for Village.

Manager will advise Chicago Aerial Ind. Inc. of this and send copy of Attorney's opinion. President stated he had been advised today of a planting program they desire to proceed with which he felt when received by Board **sh**ould be referred to our Forestry Advisory Committee. MUSCULAR DYSTROPHY ASSOC. OF AMERICA, INC.: Request permission to have 85 cannisters placed around Village by Police Dept. Manager felt this should have attention of Board &/or B.A.U.F D. Committee. MOTION Trustee Shultz that this matter be referred to Barrington Area United Fund Drive Committee for review and recommendation to Village Board; 2nd Trustee Wyatt. Ayes.

<u>GASOLENE PURCHASE:</u> Manager stated this program working well & requested approval to advertise for bids for purchase for coming year, this time to include motor oil. Discussion had on gas for motorcycles. MOTION Trustee Wyatt to authorize advertising for bids in accordance with specifications and notice to bidders; bids to be taken Aug. 3, 1966, per recommendation from Village Manager of 7-19-66; 2nd Trustee Capulli. <u>MUNICIPAL CAR #3 (Police Dept.)</u> Manager Gaffigan requested approval of proposal to advertise by letters to car dealers in Village for purchase of a used car for the Police Dept - civilian use as an additional car; covered in budger; may need an alternator later. Discussion on whether or not this would be for exclusive use of Police Dept. - primarily so, since radio now in Chief's personal car will be installed therein. MOTION Trustee Voss that Village Manager be authorized to advertise for bids for a used car for Police Dept. in accordance with recommendation of 7-21-66; 2nd Trustee Wyatt. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, Shultz, Wyatt, Voss, Hollister.

<u>DEFT. OF REVENUE</u> - Leasing Tax: Letter received duplicated for Trustees; discussion. <u>UTILITY TAX</u>: Possibilities discussed between Trustee Shultz & Manager who will check further into matter.

BARRINGTON MIDDLE SCHOOL SAN, SEWER PAYMENT: Copy of letter from Mr. Lundahl to each Trustee; Manager briefed on several phases and will check with Mr. Lundahl on waiversrecommended acceptance of payment. Re: Pollution of Flint Creek

Gentlemen:

After a great deal of time and effort, by Supt. Johanesen, Chief Muscarello as well as Park Supt. Miller, a major source of pollution of Flint Creek has been found as verified in two days of investigation by Lake County Health Department engineers. Photographs have been taken and samples of the creek in selected locations have been drawn and are being analyzed to determine the nature of the pollutants so that the offender can be told in definite terms that not only that such pollution must stop immediately, but what remedial action will be needed to eradicate the conditions existing in the creek now. The source as verified is Jewel Tea Company and they were told on July 20th, the first day of the investigation, by Mr. Johanesen accompanied by Mr. Miller that certain drainage pipes were the source of the pollution and changes in their plumbing and sewers would have to be made. On Friday morning, July 20th, detergents dumped via this same route caused deposits of foam on the creek, and Mr. Johanesen called in the Lake County Health Department at once; subsequent investigations by our Police Department and that department were completed this date. The Lake County Health Department will now confront Jewel Tea with the evidence from which remedial action by Jewel will take place, no doubt.

I did not want to inform the Village Board until incontrovertible evidence was at hand; now that we know the situation, we have no choice but to back the Health Department people to the nth degree--such pollution of fresh water streams cannot be tolerated. I have no idea how long this condition has existed; I understand the Village has received complaints intermittently over the years. Suffice to say, we should all be grateful that the source has been finally determined and bend every effort to eradicate it.

> MEMBERS PRESENT: J. C. Cadwallader, Chairman Arnett C. Lines, Secretary F. H. Beinhoff Edw. J. Dugan Henry Lipofsky Clyde Church

MR. CADWALLADER: This meeting will come to order. This is a meeting of the Zoning Board of Appeals of Barrington to hear the petition of Mr. & Mrs. John E. Krueger asking for a variation in lot size of property on East Russell Street.

Dayton Nance, representing Mr. Krueger and Mr. Krueger were sworn in.

MR. NANCE: Mr. Krueger has a large lot on East Russell Street, which is a triangular piece of property. Inasmuch as he is retiring now and this is too much to take care of, he would like to sell land to the west of his house, which is 520 East Russell Street. Under the new zoning ordinance lots must be 75 ft. wide. We have 66 ft. width. Houses to the west have 66 ft. widths and to the south on Division, Summit and Prairie Streets they are 60 ft. wide. I can see no reason why the 75 ft. should apply in this particular case. It is not a new sub-division. It would not affect any of the surrounding area. The total square feet would be over the limit.

Mr. Keating's house is to the west, then Bruce Dockery's, then the Scout Cabin, all on 66 ft. lots. This lot in question will actually be bigger than most lots within three blocks. The new ordinance penalizes all in this neighborhood. (Survey shown to the members of the Board.)

MR. CADWALLADER: Any questions by any Board Members?

MR. BLANKE: Is the Ordinance you refer to the one adopted in 1959?

Answer: Yes.

MR. BLANKE: Is it not true that all lots on Russell west of Summit are 50 ft?

MR. NANCE: Yes, and some are 60 ft. Mr. Krueger's lot is larger than 95% of the lots in the neighborhood. I feel when the Ordinance was written it should have been a lesser figure to be in keeping with the neighborhood.

MR. CADWALLADER: Any questions? Do you wish to make any statement, Mr. Krueger? (He answered no.) We will try to have our recommendation before the Village Board on August 8. This meeting stands adjourned.

My dear Mr. Gaffigan:

I am enclosing an ordinance to adopt the provisions of the BOCA housing code, as requested.

As I mentioned to you, many of these provisions merely repeat provisions already found in the general code, particularly in the building sections; and the provisions that purport to give the building inspector discretionary authority are, of course, illegal. That is why in our adopting ordinance we specifically provide that he shall have no discretionary authority but merely the power to determine the facts and enforce the ordinance.

The board's attention should be called specifically to the provision on inspections in Section H-121.0. It is quite doubtful that any building officer, or any other officer of the village, can be given the power to enter premises unless he has reasonable ground to believe that some violation of an ordinance or law is occurring. The constitutional provision against unreasonable search would apply excepting where the officer has reasonable ground to believe that some violation exists.

Since this code is printed in pamphlet form, no newspaper publication is necessary.

STENOGRAPHIC REPORT of a Public Hearing held before the Zoning Board of Appeals of the Village of Barrington, in the Village Council Chambers on July 13, 1966, at 8:30 PM, on the petition of Michael Graft. Meeting having been duly published.

MEMBERS PRESENT:

Arnett C. Lines, Secretary F. H. Beinhoff Edw. J. Dugan Henry Lipofsky Clyde Church

On motion of Mr. Dugan, seconded by Mr. Beinhoff, Mr. Lines was elected Chairman pro-ten for the evening. All ayes.

MR. LINES: (Read the petition) Everyone shall be heard that wants to speak, pro or con. The petitioner shall be heard first. Each one wishing to be heard, please be sworn in and give your name and address.

Michael J. Graft, 913 South Northwest Highway, Barrington, was sworn in. He was represented by Attorney William J. Braithwaite, 540 S. Hough St., Barrington.

Mr. Braithwaite explained that Mr. Graft desired to rearrange two lots at the southeast corner of Exmoor Avenue and Roslyn Road. The two lots are 50 feet by 175 feet deep, facing Exmoor, and they desire to face them on Roslyn making them 100 feet deep and 87.5 feet wide.

MR. BRAITHWAITE: This does not represent a zoning matter in the usual sense. The two lots are zoned R-6 and will remain so. We simply ask permission to turn these two lots around.

Mr. Braithwaite asked several questions of Mr. Graft for the purpose of record. He advised the lots were not purchased upon this request being granted, homes will be built on them, but other houses now face Roslyn Road and if these two lots could be turned around and homes built on them, it would allow greater flexibility of design and a generally more attractive arrangement of housing.

Mr. Graft further remarked that he had tried to get a building permit and was advised by Mr. Mollenkamp that he could not issue one without the permission of the Village Board. Advice from the Village attorney was that he could see no objection if it complied with the zoning. However, a technicality caused the necessity of getting Village Board permission, which would be made through the decision of the Zoning Board of Appeals.

Mr. Graft also stated that these lots were laid out before 1949 and tax bills, special assessment bills and original title policies, latter dated August 31, 1949, all showed these as two separate lots. One Village map shows them as they are laid out now and one as we desire to lay them out. There are two sewer stubs and one water stub for the property in question.

MR. LINES: Anything further.

MR. BRAITHWAITE: We rest our case.

WIND has frequently editorialized in favor of the new Illinois Revenue Proposal. Presenting an opposite viewpoint today is the President of the Illinois Municipal League of Mayors, Mayor Herbert Behrel, Mayor of Des Plaines.

The Illinois Municipal League has voted to oppose the proposed amend-

ment to the Revenue Article of the Illinois Constitution to be voted upon November 8, 1966.

The League adopted this position after a thorough study and the

concensus reached by its Board of Directors as to the requirements of a sound Revenue

Article for the State of Illinois and its local governments.

The Municipal League believes that the present Revenue Article is too restrictive and should be revised but finds that the proposed Article is even more restrictive than the present Article and does not meet the standards expected of a modern Revenue Article for our State.

A Revenue Article should be able to adapt to our changing Social and Economic conditions. It should be broad, flexible, and general and give to the Legislature, subject to realistic restrictions, the power to tax and develop for the State and its

- local governments, a taxing system suitable to meet the needs of our times.

The proposed Article is lengthy, poorly drawn, full of ambiguities, and most difficult to interpret. Its adoption can only lead to years of extensive and costly litigation. It takes away the taxing powers and sources of revenue presently available to the State and local governments and it makes one tax the alternative for another.

If our States are going to fulfill their historic role as partners in our dual State and Federal System, we must enact laws to strengthen our State governments, not weaken them. The proposed amendment moves in the wrong direction. Its adoption can only extend and hasten the intrusion and takeover by the Federal government of our State and local affairs.

This was a rebuttal editorial presented by Mayor Herbert Behrel of Des Plaines and President of the Illinois Municipal League, expressing the views of the League regarding the Illinois Revenue Proposal.

It has come to my attention that your property, described as , is one of approximately seventy-eight (78) parcels in violation of Village Ordinance #729, adopted on April 25, 1960, as follows:

"SECTION 28.204 - REMOVAL - NOTICE. It shall be the duty of the Superintendent of Public Works to serve or cause to be served a notice upon the owner or occupant of any such premises on which weeds or plants are permitted to grow in violation of the provisions of this article, and to demand the abatement of the nuisance within ten days. Provided that such notice may be given by a notice published in a newspaper published in the village to the effect that the village will cut all weeds and grass in excess of two feet in height on any premises in the village, commencing on a designated date which shall be not less than ten days after publication and charge the cost to the owner or occupant of the premises. Such publication shall be deemed notice to each such owner and occupant."

Village records indicate that publication in the newspaper has not resulted in property owners cutting their noxious weeds, plus the fact that village public works personnel have been cutting such weeds on property complained about by neighboring property owners, without charge to the property violating the ordinance. This expenditure of village funds cannot be justified, plus the fact that the Village has neither the personnel or equipment to be cutting weeds on private property.

Again this year we are in receipt of many complaints about weeds and by this personal letter to you, I urge you to take steps immediately to cut these weeds, and keep your property in a condition that will not necessitate future complaints by your neighbors. If you do not recognize your responsibility and cut these weeds, the Village will have to take action which will result in a premium charge for our personnel to take the time to cut the weeds.

I sincerely hope that you will receive this letter in the civic spirit in which it is written. Thank you.



Dear Sir:

We have your letter of June 30, 1966, with reference to the Municipal Leasing Tax adopted by your Village and asking if we could advise you as to what present or projected revenue amounts might be for your Village under this particular tax.

According to the records in this office the amount of \$77.31 has been collected for the Village of Barrington under the Municipal Leasing Occupation Tax. All of this amount has been paid into the Protest Fund as is required by the Injunction filed and pending final court decision must continue to be paid into the Protest Fund. There was a Supreme Court decision in June to the effect that the Leasing Occupation Tax was legal and we are merely waiting for the next Session of the Courts to find out whether or not an appeal is to be considered.

If the final decision is in favor of the State (municipalities and counties) the amount of money held in the Protest Fund at that time will be certified to each municipality or county.

We are not allowed by Law to advise an amount of tax paid by a particular taxpayer and inasmuch as the amount due the Village of Barrington is so small it could very well represent only one or two taxpayers, therefore, we are not listing the names of the businesses represented by the \$77.31.

In this connection we might advise that it is our custom to notify the Village Clerk each month of the amount of Municipal Tax collected and in the form letter we identify the amount paid under the Leasing Act and show that it is being paid under Protest. This way the village or city is kept informed as to their anticipated revenue.

Your letter enclosing a bill for sanitary sewer connection at Glendale Avenue for the Barrington Middle School has been received.

In accordance with Ordinance No. 883 approved on May 10, 1966, I am forwarding herewith a copy of a letter from Bruno Francis Plumbing and Heating Company in which a breakdown of costs for installing the sanitary sewer along Warwick Avenue is set forth.

In negotiating a final contract with the above referred to plumbing contractor, there was no specific amount stipulated for extending the sewer from Eastern Avenue to Glendale Avenue. When this matter was discussed with the Village Board, an estimated cost of \$4,500.00 was given. This figure was not based on a detailed take-off by the architect. Construction costs increased sharply between the time this estimate was made and the work actually performed.

I am enclosing copies of two change orders which were approved for additional costs for constructing the sever. These amount to \$1,278.59. This amount is included in the \$7,294.00.

Gentlemen:

In the rush through a short board meeting and adjournment at 9:30 P.M., the following important items should have been verbally reported:

1. Eastern Avenue is complete and open to traffic as of July 9th--the school is installing driveway aprons and must take steps to stop soil from washing from their parking lot over the sidewalk and into the street near Warwick Avenue.

2. Main Street sidewalk is complete as of July 9th with only clean up left to be done.

3. Fill material is continuing to be placed for our proposed roadway between the railroad and present Hillside Avenue. The railroad has agreed upon my request to dump directly from their rail tilt cars onto the site, with our Public Works personnel moving the material into the proper locations. A culvert has been temporarily installed to drain the Younghusband property to the Hillside culvert and then to the lake, and since the northside of the railroad ditch drains directly into Baker's Lake, as verified in the field, there will be no drainage problems.

4. The Fox Point trunk sewer is now completely connected and remedial work on and the construction route joints/plus TV inspection of the line is now in process.

5. Copies attached of Mr. Townsend's letter to me, dated July 8, 1966, concerning representation of private developers in the Village while functioning as Village Engineers is self-explanatory. As you know, we have discussed this matter informally particularly in terms of Etters' Glendale Addition and Seeger-Anderson Resubdivision. Unless I hear from any of you before July 18th, the following letter will be sent to Mr. Townsend: "Receipt of your letter of July 8th is acknowledged and a copy of which has been duplicated for each member of the Village Board. I know I speak for them when I say that we most assuredly desire that your firm continue as Village Consulting Engineers; and so that such representation be above reproach, your firm should not represent private developers seeking village approval of plans and specifications for improvements in the Village of Barrington. In my personal opinion, it is just not possible for one to review one's own work, no matter how well qualified or wellintentioned it may be.

As usual, your very astute letter perceives our concern in this matter and this letter written, on behalf of the Village Board, lays that concern to rest now that we understand one another."

6. I plan to take time to drive to Detroit and pick up my family on Friday the 15th, returning either Saturday the 16th or Sunday the 17th, depending on the condition of my father-in-law who is hospitalized with three different maladies; two of which require major surgery, when his condition can stand it.

Dear Mr. Gaffigan:

At a meeting of the Village Board held on May 9, 1966, which was attended by our Mr. Hennessy, one of the Trustees questioned the propriety of our performing engineering services for private builders and land developers on projects within the Village of Barrington while at the same time serving as Village Engineers.

The procedure of performing all engineering services in a municipality has in many instances been followed by us at the specific request of the Village officials, on the assumption that engineering responsibilities within a particular municipality could be definitely fixed. In situations such as this, our primary responsibility has, and always will be, the municipality and it has always been our intent to pursue strict compliance with local subdivision regulations. On the other hand, in some instances we have been requested to refrain from the performance of engineering services for private developers while serving as Engineers for the municipality. We do not believe it is necessary to discuss the advantages or disadvantages of functioning in a dual role. Suffice it to say that we have always made it clear to existing and prospective municipal clients that we would be governed by their desires in pursuing and accepting engineering engagements in areas under their jurisdiction. The writer recalls specifically discussing this matter with you shortly after your arrival in Barrington. Our policy in this matter is very clear and because of the circumstances that have developed we feel it is worthy of repetition at this time. If it is the desire of the Village officials of Barrington that we, functioning as Village Engineers, refrain from the performance of engineering for any private interests in the fields of land development or home building, please so advise us and we will be governed accordingly in our future engineering activities in the Village.

We do not feel that this matter is of sufficient importance to require formal action by the Board of Trustees and we will comply with whatever informal action the Board sees fit to take.

In your reply letter of May 4, 1966 to our engineering report letter concerning the operation of the sewage treatment works serving the Village of Barrington, you indicated that the Village engineers had been directed to undertake a sampling and laboratory program to ascertain the efficiency of the existing facilities. To date, we have received no results of this program.

The Illinois Sanitary Water Board has recently placed increased emphasis on the elimination of the bypass of untreated or partially treated sewage to waters of the State. It is to this end that we are now requiring that the treatment plants in Lake County install additional facilities to provide tertiary treatment of the plant effluent. These facilities are required to insure the removal of <u>all</u> floating and settleable solids from the plant effluent. We, therefore, again request that the Village of Barrington proceed with plans to install these required facilities.

Our records indicate that the facilities for the Village of Barrington are designed to treat an average daily flow of 1.0 million gallons and are presently receiving average flows of 0.9 mgd exclusive of the flows bypassed after the primary clarifier.

Since the Sanitary Water Board is charged with the responsibility of preventing the pollution of waters of the State caused, in part, by overloaded treatment facilities, the Village of Barrington should consider this letter as official notification that all requests for permits for sanitary sewer extensions to the municipal system will be critically reviewed, and possibly denied, until the question of plant capacity is resolved.

We request an acknowledgment of receipt of this letter, together with a statement of the intent of the Village of Barrington to comply with the above requirements.



Gentlemen:

Attached herewith are two proposals for repair of damaged house sanitary sewer stub connections to sewers on Applebee Street and on west Station Street. The situation on west Station Street has been a continuing maintenance problem for about a year, and the Applebee Street location is some three months in age.

Both locations are approximately 17 feet in depth, which is too deep for village equipment and personnel to repair, so contract work is necessary. 

Re: Radios for Public Works Dept.

Gentlemen:

As authorized in the 1966-67 budget appropriation, the Public Works Superintendent has solicited two proposals for five mobile units and a base station, all of which are transistorized. Prices of the units have been checked against other suppliers of these units and found to be lower. I have discussed this matter with Superintendent Johanesen, and it is felt that there is no immediate need for the new base station and that the money for that item would be better spent having the contractor salvage as many of the existing five mobile units as possible in view of the fact that they will be needed for the meter truck, the new dump truck, and the need for a unit in the rear of the garage for the mechanic, for a total of eight units in all.

A copy of the two proposals are attached for your information, and based upon them, it is recommended that the method of obtaining these radios be on an installed basis, in accordance with the proposal of Richard B. Etters, dated March 28, 1966, not to exceed \$1000.00 including reconditioning of existing units, which replaces the new base station as shown in the proposal.

Gentlemen:

By letter of June 17, 1966 two copies of plans and specifications for the northwest area storm sewer were transmitted to me from Mr. Hodel of Consoer-Townsend. By letter of June 20th, (copy attached) I personally raised thirteen questions about the design and its cost to Mr. Townsend, plus requesting two more copies of plans and specifications. With a project of this cost and magnitude, it is important that as many village officials as possible review these plans--if desired, I will request that every member of the Board of Local Improvements have copies to look at <u>before</u> holding a public hearing thereon.

By letter of June 21, 1966 Attorney Kreger transmitted the original and two copies of the first resolution and the ordinance to be adopted for this project by the Board of Local Improvements. I raised the question to Mr. Kreger by phone that the public benefit portion of \$36,000 of the special assessment to be paid out of MFT funds was not clearly delineated in the ordinance on page 8, nor in the engineer's estimate on page 12.

After checking the language, he agreed with me and will have revised page 12 of the engineer's estimate and revised page 8 of the ordinance sent to me as soon as practicable.

No one wants this project under construction better than me, but I want the President and Board to act in an informed manner when the public hearing is held on this storm sewer project; hence my questions of the engineers and attorneys at this point.

Receipt of two copies of plans and specifications from Mr. Hodel for the proposed northwest area storm sewer on June 17, 1966 is acknowledged. I have the following questions before I recommend that the Board of Local Improvements proceed with a public hearing on this matter.

- 1. What is the total benefit area, and why is it fractionalized on sheet two, and what do the numbers and letters refer to?
- 2. If there are going to be cross connections of existing culverts from the south side of Northwest Highway between Exmoor and Cumnor Avenues to the proposed storm sewer on the north side, why isn't some area on the south side shown in the area to benefit? (I understand that this area south of the highway was the subject of benefit versus non-benefit when the sanitary sewer was installed under Special Assessment #71).
- 3. Why is there a change from your feasibility study showing 36 and 42 inch sizes of the trunk line sewer to 42 and 48 inch in this report?
- 4. Why is there a design of 312 feet of 42 inch "lowhead pressure" sewer at 45.00/ lin. feet next to the village water reservoir?
- 5. Why does alignment follow the north line of property west of the reservoir instead of its south line?

- 6. Is it absolutely necessary to adjust 133 feet of the 8" sanitary sewer on Exmoor Avenue?
- 7. Why is alignment of the sewer on Bryant Avenue on its east side with cross connections of 8 and 10 inches near the reservoir property, rather than its west side?
- 8. Why the triangular arrangement of drainage structures in the Bryant and Waverly intersection?
- 9. Why additional short lengths of pipe and inlets at Exmoor Avenue and Northwest Highway and at the railroad culvert?
- 10. Why is it necessary to seed .4 acres of parkland near the railroad culvert?
- 11. Couldn't the route through the park be open ditch instead of enclosed in a 48" drainage pipe in the interests of lower construction costs?
- 12. Why is the alignment of the pipe on the north side of Roslyn Road with cross connections from the south side, rather than the south side?
- 13. Why does the village get only two copies of this material and four are sent to the village attorney? Please send two more sets of plans and specifications at your earliest opportunity.

I personally feel that with a project of this cost and magnitude, every possible question should be raised and answered sufficiently by your firm before the village authorizes things to proceed any further, hence this is my contribution to those questions--I am sure other village officials will have some as well.

Re: Seegers-Anderson Resubdivision of Spruce Road

Gentlemen:

Reference is made to the letter, dated June 17, 1966, received on June 21, 1966 from Mr. Hodel of Consoer, Townsend and Associates. The two sets of plans and specifications have been reviewed by Mr. Johanesen and me and the following comments are made:

1. In regard to the letter's request to waive sidewalks, I believe this is in order and so recommend the Village Board to do.

2. To the request to reduce the pavement width from the required 28 feet to the back to back of curb width of Spruce Road intersection return of 24 feet is in line with the procedure followed on Oak Road and Walnut Road when they were extended in Jewel Park, and so recommend that the pavement of Spruce Road be 24 feet wide back to back of curb.

3. The watermain and sewer extensions are according to village code requirements and it is recommended that the Village Manager be authorized to sign the State Sanitary Water Board sewer permit and the watermain extension acknowledgment for return to Consoer, Townsend and Associates.

4. SECTION VII - AGREEMENTS of the Subdivision Ordinance requires the submission of an agreement executed by the owner and the subdivider agreeing to make and install the improvements provided in Section VIII in accordance with the plans and specifications accompanying the final plat. No such agreement is on file with the Village at this time.

5. The plans call for a 10' easement for a drainage swale northerly from between Lots 3 and 4 with no indication of the disposition of this run-off. It is felt that this drainage should be enclosed in a pipe and connect easterly to Magnolia Road, where there exists a 12" storm sewer.

Dear Mr. Gaffigan:

Thank you for your letter of June 14th. I am pleased that you are satisfied with the scheduling of our Courts in Barrington. I have been in the process of trying to locate some furniture to equip at least the first-floor Courtroom. I believe that it was Mr. Shea of Judge Boyle's office who indicated that some furniture was available. I have been unable to reach him and as soon as he lets me know I will again get in touch with you.

As I informed your Chief Muscarello in our recent, personal conference, it would seem to me that the smaller, first-floor Courtroom will be ample for the time being at least, to take care of local cases originating in Barrington and Barrington Hills. In setting up the Court system in our Third District I have been mindful of the assurances given to the municipalities that their local traffic or ordinance Court would receive due consideration and, if at all possible, would remain in session within the village. On the other hand, misdemeanor cases (which must be prosecuted by a State's Attorney) must be consolidated in a more central location due to the limited number of Assistant State's Attorneys available. The same logic applies to the placement of Jury Courts.

I make these comments in view of the fact that I have heard suggestions that we establish a Jury Branch in Barrington. In my humble opinion, such a proposal is geographically unsound -- and quite unnecessary. Of course, if a Jury Branch were to be established, the first-floor room would be completely inadequate due to the size of a jury box. I have confidence that using the first-floor Courtroom and limiting the cases to traffic and ordinance cases prosecuted by your local village prosecutors will prove to be most workable.
