I was named John Henry Lageschulte during the first week after my birth. This was my grandfather's name and I was his first grandson. Mother didn't like the name so she called me "Jack" for short.

During the first year of my life I gave Mom and Dad a rough time. I ate and slept very little, and I cried a great deal. When I was six months "young" I was ill with double pneumonia. When I was sick these two months I was inactive but I usually amount of pep and energy.



At eight months I could sit alone and when I was 12½ months I could walk by myself. Riding my bike was accomplished at two and one half years. I could roller skate by the time I was four.

My first sentence was spoken at 22 months while we were returning from a trip to Waupaca, Wisconsin. Whenever I saw a barn I said, "Moo cow night-night baarn." This went on for about 50 miles until I fell asleep in my mother's arms.

Music was always a pleasure to me. I always had a drum or a horn. At the first sound of the band marching down the street; I was on my way.

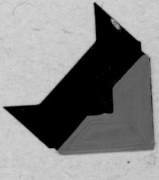
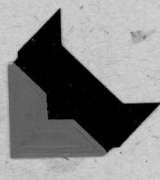
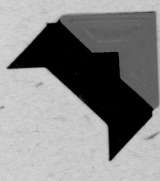
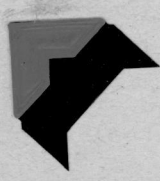

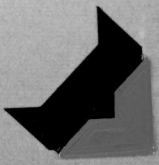
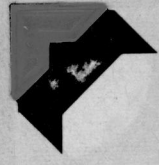
My special aptitudes were making things out of wood, especially boats. I enjoyed my tap and tumbling lessons when I was four.

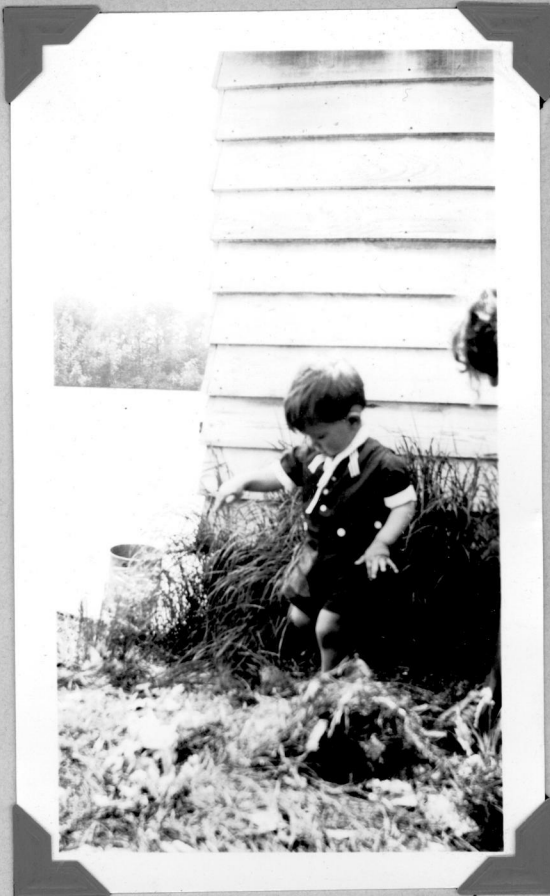

My thrilling adventure occurred when I was 8 years old. Lake Zurich was having a carnival and the Colored Giants were playing that day. I wanted to go to the carnival and the game and my parents were going to take me. Dad took me there and went home, He was going to pick me up at 4 o'clock, after the game. He also gave me a quarter and told me I could spent it on the rides when he got there. I was not to leave the grounds either.

The game was over and my dad hadn't showed up yet. I was getting worried. I told Sandra Tate's parents to call my Dad and Mom and have them come and pick me up. It grew later and still no Dad.

At home Mom and Dad were getting worried because they thought I had come home with someone else or had fallen in the lake and was at the bottom or the Negroes had taken me home. They called Ward Flock and asked him if I had come home with him. He said I hadn't. Mother claaed everyone she knew that might know about my prescience.

In the meanwhile I had watched the water fights and had gotten in the way of one of the hoses and I was sopped. The night was quite cool and I was chilled to the bone. I kept waiting for my mothe r to pick me up.

My mother and Dad went to Paletine to see if the Wendts knew where I was. They didn't.

Finally my mother and father found me. It was about 11 o'clock at night and I was tired, cold, wet, and almost in tears. The first thing mother and father did was to get me something to eat and dad put his coat over me to keep me warm.

The facts about the story are as follows. I had gone back to the carnival after the game. Dad had come for me but he couldn't find me.

I saw him going around the corner but he didn't see me. I was to stay put and not to spend the quarter, but I found a nickel on the ground and since there wasn't anything to eat for a nickel, I tried to get a dime by putting the money in the slot machine. I lost as most of the people do and I didn't have any money besides the quarter which I wasn't to spend.

When we got home Mother fixed me some cocoa and sandwiches and my father gave me a dollar for being a "good little soldier, and obeying orders".

My grade school days were happy ones: no homework!! After school let out my work for the day was finished. I could listen to the radio and play-out-of-doors. I was fond of most of my teachers.

I passed Kindergarten under the supervision of Miss Wallace. This was the year I took tap dancing lessons after school

On the first grade with Miss Trexler. She was fat and jolly and we all had a good time. This was the year I had the surprise "birthday party". It was an unusual party in the fact that it was a surprise on Mother and not me. I arrived home from school with 10 kids trailing me. Mother wasn't aware of it until I arrived upon the scene. Mother quickly got cup cakes and ice cream and the party went on as planned?

Miss Luther was my second grade teacher. I was getting more reliable and dependable. I don't beat up quite as many kids on the way from school.

Miss Miller took over during my fourth year in school. We used to go to Huntley to the farm. I also won a prize in the flower show that year. As I am getting older my interests are more varied.

During fourth grade my teacher was Miss Hones. Miss Hones and Miss Brooks, my fifth grade teacher weren't too friendly. I was president of our class during fifth grade. During fifth grade Mother and Father bought me a clarinet. Mr. Fred was the one who helped me progress. By the end of fifth grade I was in the High School band. Late in the year I started playing the oboe. In the summer I took lessons from Mr. Sears. When I started sixth grade I was in the Barrington High School Band and Orchestra. I enjoyed chorus and I went to La Salle with a few other children to sing.
