**T**he symbolism of the Advent Candle Wreath helps us to prepare for Christ as the Light of the World. The Advent wreath is a circle, reminding us of the perfection and eternity of God. The evergreen, of which the wreath is made, is a symbol of eternity and also of life. The candles, which are lit each Sunday, symbolize Hope – Peace – Joy - Love.



**November 28:** Worship at 9:00 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. The first candle is lit to remind us that Christ is our hope and the hope of the world.

**December 5:** Worship at 9:00 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. The second candle is lit to remind us that Christ is the Prince of Peace.

**December 5:** Advent Dinner at 5:30 p.m. Bring a dish to share and a wrapped ornament. Program presented by Bernice's Bells Handbell Choir and a visiting children's choir from Elgin.

**December 12:** Worship at 9:00 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. The third candle is lit to remind us that joy is a gift from God and that Christ came and is coming.

**December 19:** Worship at 9:00 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. The fourth candle is lit to remind us that God is love.

**December 24:** 5:00 p.m. Family Candlelight Service. This will be a family oriented service. Children of all ages are encouraged to attend to celebrate Christ as the Light of the World.



**December 24:** 7:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m. Candlelight, Lessons and Carols - The Christmas Story. An adaptation of the festival of lessons and carols. It is patterned after a service of nine lessons and carols, first used in the Truro Cathedral, England, and adapted in 1918 for the King's College Chapel, Cambridge. Our vocal and bell choirs will lead the carols. In lieu of communion on Christmas Eve, communion will be served on January 2, 2005.

**December 24:** 11:00 p.m. Candlelight service with traditional sermon and carols. We light the Christ candle as we proclaim Christ as the Light of the World. Each person then receives the Light of Christ as we sing Silent Night.

Dear Friends in Christ,

We read books differently at different times in our lives. To read something in your childhood, then in your teen years, again in mid-life, and yet again in later life, is to read the same book differently.

Frederick Buechner suggests that a book we need to read at each stage of our lives is *The Wizard of Oz*. The Scarecrow, the Tin Woodsman, and the Lion are on a journey seeking to find something they want but believe they lack. One wants a brain, another wants a heart, and the third wants courage. The journey reveals two surprises: (1) the Wizard turns out to be no wizard at all and (2) the Wizard is only a wizard because he looked deeply inside these pilgrims and saw who they really were.

To see greatness and bring it out is what education is all about. To educate comes from the Latin, ex + ducere, meaning "to lead or bring forth." The whole point of education is to bring forth all the wisdom, love and courage that are part of who you are even though there are lots of times when you simply don't believe that those things are a part of you.

Once there was a wizard from Nazareth who saw inside people and said, "The Kingdom of God is within you." He looked deeply inside at the scarecrows, lions, tin men and women of his day, who were like us, and said: "Be not afraid. You are the light of the world. You are the salt of the earth." He brought out of them what was within them and at the same time placed within them this calm described by Julian of Norwich: "And all shall be well . . . And all shall be well . . . And all manner of things shall be well."

That "wellness" begins the moment we allow the trusted Wizard of Nazareth to look deeply inside us to see what is truly there and then to bring it out. In that moment, we are blessed – and the world is, too!



## Church Administration

### Session

Notes from the October 25 Session meeting:

**Trustees:** U.S. Cellular has presented a preliminary proposal to put an antenna into our steeple. They would build a new steeple and would need room to store equipment that would support the antenna, which would be completely hidden. The Presbytery would have to approve this. U.S. Cellular would also pay rent for keeping the antenna in the steeple. There do not appear to be any health hazards to doing this. Trustees were given the approval to explore this in detail and get a firm proposal from U.S. Cellular. From a financial standpoint this would be a benefit to the church.



**Communications:** Jack Swenson presented a revision to the church logo that has more color in it and offered the following motion, which was approved.

1. Accept the changes to the logo as presented to reflect a change to the text font at the bottom of the cross. The logo will remain with blue rays with no additional text, along with a gray logo that is more easily reproduced in a smaller size.
2. Support the Communications Committee's effort in developing a PR/marketing campaign that will include the new logo, updated website, marketing materials, templates and processes for the committees and ministries. The logo, website, tapestries, and selected printed materials will be introduced to the congregation on January 30, 2005 at our annual congregational meeting.
3. Authorize the Communications Committee to identify two vendors to provide proposals for the design and creation of two tapestries. These tapestries will incorporate the changed logo and will be permanently displayed in the sanctuary. Estimates over \$2,000 will be presented to Session for final approval.

**Personnel:** Peter Schmidt has resigned as Sexton. Session thanked him for his many years of service to the church. The cleaning service will continue for 20 hours a week and a part-time person will be hired to perform the duties of Sexton.

**Stewardship:** Bob Skopek discussed the upcoming "Celebration of Faith" Ball, to be held on January 22, 2005 at the Hyatt, Schaumburg. Bob gave an update of the Stewardship Campaign which is going well. About half of the pledging units have responded, and we are about half way to our stewardship goal.

**Worship:** Anna Armstrong presented guidelines concerning the Moment With Young Disciples, which were approved by the Worship Committee. Joy's handbell choir is moving along well. Details of how to set up the bells in the sanctuary need to be decided. Joy Hague will develop a schematic outlining how the tables are to be arranged.

### Trustees

At its meeting on October 18 the Trustees reviewed the church financials as of September 30 and determined the we are on budget for revenue and expenses for fiscal 2004. A contributing factor to containing expenses is the help of many volunteers, both those who count and deposit weekly contributions and those who contribute time and labor to upgrading the church buildings and grounds. This month the Trustees especially want to thank and recognize the teen youth group for two service projects for the church. On Sunday, October 31<sup>st</sup> they washed windows. On Sunday, November 7, they painted many colorful doors on the lower level. The youth group painters were Phil Monie, Drew Bosarge, Michael Zimmerman and Mark Minner, assisted by an adult crew composed of Eric Enskat, Julia Monie and Melissa Armstrong-Hansche.

## Stephen Ministry

### CARING MINISTRY WORKSHOP

The sun shown many ways on the Caring Ministry Workshop held Saturday, November 6, at our church. To begin with, it was a beautiful fall day, and 66 participants came eager and open to learn. It was a great mix of people, coming from as far away as East Moline and Kankakee and representing a variety of congregations - Baptists, Methodists, Lutherans, Presbyterians, Episcopalians, and Evangelicals.

The presenter, Reverend Kevin Scott from the Executive Staff of Stephen Ministries, St. Louis, started with a session on grief that gave many down-to-earth and practical suggestions on "do's and don'ts" for providing care to those suffering the pain of a loss. Some of those suggestions could well be summed up in the title of a new Stephen Ministries book, "Don't Sing Songs to a Heavy Heart."

The second session covered various aspects of Stephen Ministry and had each congregation working to determine numbers of people in their church who might have various kinds of needs for compassionate care. Reverend Scott answered questions about



working to establish a Stephen Ministry program, training, and costs. He also invited perusal of the resource table which contained books and tapes on a variety of topics available from Stephen Ministries.

In the third and final session, each individual was paired with a partner who was initially a stranger. After a series of exercises participants learned the value of careful listening and could discern how different prayer can be when the person being prayed for is more intimately known.

Many people from our Stephen Ministry team helped with the workshop, and there were also a number from our congregation who came to get a better understanding of what Stephen Ministry is all about. We should take pride in how far our church has come in less than three years and how we can already be a beacon to other congregations who would like to know more about one-on-one distinctively Christian care. We hope these congregations will take the light of Stephen Ministry from our church to theirs

### Deacon's Corner, Roy Brinson

As we come into the season of Advent, I am reminded of what faith and Christianity is all about. Since joining PCB over a year ago, I found a true re-awakening of my Christian values.

My family moved from the southern suburbs and a more restrictive Presbyterian Church in the mid 1960s

to Barrington. I came and listened to Dr. Brown on Sunday, but never joined this congregation.

After college, Church did not fit into my lifestyle nor my spiritual needs, I thought. My life was based on ME, not on others. Years went by, I got engaged to Debbie and we discussed getting married here in the Church, as her two older sisters had been married here twenty years before (kind of a family thing!). Still no thoughts of spiritual needs. Our lives seemed busy but not complete—something was missing.

Debbie's daughter was married in 1996 and our first grandchildren (twins) were born a year later, another grandson was born in 2000. I started to realize how important life and God's work were to my being. Almost two years ago, Debbie and I started coming here and listening to Curt and Dan and feeling the love of God and the members of PCB. So, when the opportunity to become a Deacon was made available, I discussed it with Debbie and a few members of the congregation that I knew and trusted. I was nominated and accepted by the congregation earlier this year.

We do home visitations, flower deliveries on Sunday, in-home communions, send get well, birthday, anniversary, and sympathy cards. We will do the upcoming Advent Dinner as well as two Sunday services a year. We do coffee service on Sundays and follow-up calls to our parish members reminding them of activities of the church.. We work with Session and the Trustees to help make our church a more spiritual and friendly place to our congregation and visitors.

How has this helped me? I am trying to no longer have the "I" or "ME" as the center of my being. I have learned that God is my Savior and someday I hope I will dwell in the house of the Lord forever.




### Stewardship Committee
