Dear Friends in Christ,

As we go through our day to day lives, most of us need a word of encouragement and sometimes a word of guidance. Consequently, as people of faith, we find ourselves listening for the voice of God. But hearing God's voice isn't easy because there are so many voices running around in our heads.

Some voices sound like an overprotective mother who did not let you get your own way. Some voices sound like a stern father who told you that you need to guard your emotions. Some of us hear the voice of a pastor who said you weren't good enough for the love of God and that worship was a time of fear. Some voices simply tell us that anyone who disagrees with our position should be shown our anger.

God's voice is different. God's voice does not have to be an earthquake, wind or fire, but a still small voice. God's voice is filled with love, "You are my beloved child." God's voice is often an invitation, "Come to me whatever your condition and I will give you rest." God's voice calls us to make a choice, "If you want to follow me, give up clutching your possession and hug a friend and an enemy." God's voice is one of healing, "Rise, pick up your pallet and walk."

As Christians we need to understand that many of our friends hear different voices at different times in their lives. Sometimes we're not completely sure what voice we are listening to ourselves. Some say, "Listen to your gut feeling." I prefer to say, "Listen to your heart."

Remember the nurturing voices in your life. Remember the voices who spoke when you were baptized and promised to be there to guide you in times of need. Remember the voices of those who love you. And remember the voice of our loving Master and Savior who said, "I am with you always."



Church Administration

Session

August and September meeting notes:

Christian Education: The 2004 Youth Mission Trip to Yacamaw, WA, 6/19-6/27/04 was discussed. The trip will involve farm work, bible study, and light maintenance work. Because transportation costs will be greater than in the past due to the distance, the cost estimate is about \$700/person, with each participant contributing \$450. Fund raising activities will be occurring during the year to pay for this trip.



Communication: Don Minner said that the logo will be introduced in the next Carillon. The committee is working on a roll out plan for cards, stationary, letterhead, etc. The web site is expected to be ready by October 1, 2003. Don mentioned that a document is also being prepared that will outline how the logo is to be used.

Deacons – The home communion program was discussed. Letters were sent out to 15 members to ask if they would like this service. Training sessions will be held to conduct this service. The deacons will be having a guest speaker at their next meeting to discuss how to handle situations where people in our congregation have special needs. This will help the deacons enhance their skills in this area. Deacons will also be working with the membership/outreach committee to visit newcomers to our church that identified themselves on the pew registration sheet. The Deacons have begun their new parish program which will include in its new emphasis following-up with visitors to our church as well as contacting existing parish members through cards (i.e. Birthday cards). It is hoped this will enable the Deacons to better know the members of their parish.

Music Search: In the search for a new organist and Music Director, the music search committee conducted an informal audit of congregants to gauge what they are looking for in a music program. Anna Armstrong

discussed several points that came out of their congregational survey to include:

- People enjoy different types of music;
- The choir is an important part of the service;
- It would be nice to have people outside of the choir to sing on special occasions;
- Tempo/volume/appropriate selections need to be addressed;
- Desire to have a “worship” environment prior to the start of the service;
- Desire to have a hand bell choir.

The committee is in its final phases of the search and wants to advertise for a Director of Music and a full time Organist. A process is being developed to review the candidates and hear them play. Salary guidelines are already in place. A job description should be developed for these positions. A motion was approved to authorize the Music Search Committee to expend \$300 to search for these positions, that the salaries be consistent with current budget numbers, and that the Music Committee be given the option of selecting one person to fill both positions, or to fill the two positions separately.

Personnel – The appraisal/review process has begun for the church staff. Some congregants will be asked to give their opinions regarding staff members to help with the evaluation process. Goals and objectives for 2004 will also be set during the next several months

Disciples & Stewards

During the past five weeks, my Disciple class and I have worked our way through about one / seventh of our course material, videos, and small group discussions. Material that once seemed jumbled and out of order, somewhat irrelevant to me in the twenty-first century, and often absurd in the light of modern science, has come to make simple, clear, common sense. God, the supreme authority made this world, a wonderful place. Man (and I) exist in a state of sin, chaos, and rebellion from God. To provide escape from this awful condition, God has created a covenant with mankind and me, offering His blessing and deliverance for obedience, discipleship, and stewardship.

In this Carillon I am reporting my observations on the linkage between Disciples and Stewards. Here is the story that God is telling me as I progress through my Disciple program.

In Genesis, God sent me a clear message. While He claims authority over this world and my life, He gives me free will to explore His creation, making decisions both good and bad, conscious and unconscious. He has endless patience as He allows me to go forward in my lifelong journey, using His scripture and inspiration as my guide. My choice is whether to follow my agenda or His. By choosing His agenda, I become a Disciple.

In Genesis, I learned about the majesty and wonder of His fabulous creation. There is simply so much that has been given to me. But He makes it clear to me that I have to deal responsibly with His creation. What are some of my responsibilities? Initially we talked about the basics, not polluting the earth, working for peace, helping the poor, etc. But ultimately I reached the understanding that I am responsible for using my gifts for His agenda, not mine. By choosing to use my gifts (including talents) for his purposes I become a Steward.

Genesis also covers sin. God has given me so much prosperity that I often believe that it is of my own creation. The stories of Adam and Eve, Cain and Abel, Noah, the Tower of Babel, David, and ultimately Jeremiah's lament for Judah and Jerusalem remind me of how easy it is to worship the false gods of my possessions, endless desire for pleasure, and ambitions. It is so easy not to worship, serve, support, and share. I have learned that Discipleship requires making hard choices with my time, talents, and resources, if I am to be a Steward.

As I continued my studies through Genesis, I realized that God, as he did with Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, is always testing me. I have learned that I have the choice of accepting or rejecting his covenant, but not modifying it to my own terms. My blessings will come from Discipleship as I enter the covenant of faith, trusting Him and giving back my portion.

Recently I was walking along Kimberly Road on a beautiful sunny fall afternoon, having a long talk with God. I thanked him for recently saving my life (again, for he has done it many times) and asked him what else could I do for Him. Was there something new, grand? I was in a hurry. I wanted to know his next agenda for me and get in the game. For a while I thought that it was a one-way conversation until I told the story to my wife, Susan, who promptly reminded me that part of God's covenant is his blessing, and the other part is my commitment to Discipleship and Stewardship. Blessing, Discipleship, and Stewardship are clearly intertwined on His timetable.

I can only hope that each of you has been as blessed as I have been and are willing to stand to be his Disciples and Stewards, especially as we enter this important fall fundraising campaign. Remember your blessings and give back proportionately of your time, talent, and treasure.

Stephen Ministry: A Gift

Our church has received a special gift. That gift was given to our church by Session in 2000, when they granted the request of our Deacons to begin a Stephen Ministry program at our church. To let you know what a similar gift meant to a man in a church far from here, let me tell you about a man named Richard. His friends call him Dick.

Dick may sound familiar to you because he is so much like many of us at different points in our lives. During his successful career he planned for an active and fit retirement with his wife of many years. He looked forward to these years with great anticipation. After retiring he filled his days with golf, travel, golf, grandkids, golf, volunteer work...and he was even able to fit in a little golf.

What Dick had not planned for were the surgeon's words, "Your cancer is inoperable and terminal. There is nothing more I can do." Suddenly this active and outgoing man had the rug pulled out from under him. He felt afraid, alone and hopeless. Not wanting to burden his wife and family, he kept these feelings to himself. Not wanting to appear anything other than happy and "together" to others, he revealed little about his illness to friends. His wife, out of concern, urged him to seek out a Stephen Minister. (Stephen Ministry had been well-established in their church for some years.) Dick's response: "I'll be all right. Someone else needs one more than I do." Translation: "I don't want anyone to know how much I'm struggling." Or, "Talking about this means I have to face it." Perhaps each of you has felt similarly when facing a difficult time in your life.

After talking with his pastor, Dick decided to accept a Stephen Minister. He was paired with another retired executive who turned out to be the best thing for Dick at this point in his life. They met for coffee, went to lunch and occasionally visited at home. Sometimes the

Stephen Minister didn't say much. But he was there...fully present. His assurance of complete confidence, and the trust they built together, made it easy for Dick to finally talk about what this "death sentence" felt like. In a non-judgmental and compassionate way, Dick began walking this new and frightening journey with his brother in Christ.

Stephen Ministry was a GIFT to Dick. A gift of the presence of someone who would listen, provide encouragement and hope. His Stephen Minister was someone whom Dick did not have to worry about burdening.

Stephen Ministry was also a GIFT to Dick's wife. Her life had also been turned upside down. She felt a bit of peace knowing that there was someone else who was helping her husband deal with his feelings. She also requested a Stephen Minister to support her during this very difficult period.

Stephen Ministry was also a GIFT to Dick's Stephen Minister. The privilege of walking beside someone during a difficult time was a gift from God. To offer the true peace and comfort of Christ, and to share his God-given gifts in this way further deepened his own faith.

Now Stephen Ministry is a GIFT to each one of you as you face the inevitable challenges of this life. Perhaps it's not cancer...perhaps it's a new baby, a relocation, a job loss, or a deep loneliness. A Stephen Minister can be there for you too.

Youth Mission Trip 2004: Washington June 19 – 27

We plan to fly from Chicago non-stop to Seattle, then rent some vans. We will be staying in Seattle overnight, probably at a church. Once we worship we will be on our way to the site!



Sounds easy? Much planning is needed in the next few months to make even the first part of our experience happen. Who does all of the planning? The youth. Committees are formed and an adult advisor assigned. Travel/sightseeing, VBS, publicity . . . all are in the hands of the youth.

The Travel committee will be investigating airfare and van rates. They will also be planning our route from

Seattle to Wapato, making sure that we see all sites possible. Mount St. Helen on the trip back? Could be a possibility. The Work Project committee not only decides on the projects to be completed, but they also serve as Project Managers once on-site (even the adults have to do what they say). The VBS committee will be hard at work, planning and purchasing supplies to make the children's experience prayerful, yet playful. Those who will serve on the Devotions committee will be choosing the trip's theme and scriptures, gathering music, prayers and other resources to provide the spiritual growth experiences for their peers. And the slide show? Preplanned by the Publicity/Historian Committee which decides which pictures to take. That committee will also work to keep the congregation informed before, during and after this year's trip to Wapato, Washington and the Yakama Nation Reservation.

Yakama Nation Fact:

On June 9, 1855 governor and superintendent of Indian affairs, Isaac Stevens of the Washington Territory, and representatives of the Cayuse, Umatilla, Wallawalla, Nez Perce and Yakama tribes met with government officials to establish territorial land along with additional privileges and payments on behalf of the Indian natives. On this date The Treaty of 1855 was created, setting aside 1.4 million acres of land to form what is now known as the Yakima Indian Nation, the home of 6,300 native Yakama residents (1998 Yakama Nation Special Events & Activities Program Book, 1998 & Healy, 1999). This treaty was formed to aid in the remigration of various tribes to their native lands without the invasion of white settlers.

At the signing of the Treaty in 1855, fourteen bands and tribes were affiliated into the Yakima Indian Nation that is located along the western border of the Great Columbia Plateau in the lee of the Cascade Range (Schuster, 1975). As named on the Treaty they include the Klickitat, the Klinquit, the Kow-was-say-ee, the Kah-milt-pah, the Li-ay-was, the Oche-chotes, the Palouse, the Pisuose, the Skin-pah, the Se-ap-cat, the Shyiks, the Wenatchapam, the Wish-ham, and the Yakama. Although these tribes are very diverse, they contrarily are culturally similar. They are all Sahaptian-speaking people who came together to for the Confederated Tribes and Bands of the Yakima Indian Nation.
