Mrs. Henry C. Payne and her niece, Miss Louise M. Jones, have left Milwaukee for Washington.

Governor and Mrs. Beckman Winthrop sailed from Porto Rico for New York on the steamship Philadelphia.

Rev. W. Alexander Shaw, for two years pastor of the First Congregational church of Prairie du Chien, Wis., has been appointed field secretary of the American Anti-Slavery league.

Miss Annie S. Peck, the American mountain climber, arrived in New York on the Panama line steamer Advance from Colon.

Governor-elect Frank Higgins of New York has certified that his election expenses were \$29, the largest sum spent for this purpose in many years in that state.

A temporary restraining order to prevent the issuing of tax sale decrees on nonproducing mine properties in the Cripple Creek, Co. district was issued by Judge Lewis.

Two persons were injured in a collision of the Chicago express west bound, on the Grand Trunk railroad and a light pilot engine near St. Catherine's, Ont.

The will of the late Eldridge M. Fowler of Pasadena, Cal., gives the widow \$500,000 and valuable real estate.

Bishop Samuel Fallows of Chicago has been appointed chaplain of the Second Infantry, Illinois National Guard, with rank of captain.

Governor La Follette of Wisconsin, accompanied by his wife and children, has arrived in St. Louis to visit the World's Fair.

Robert S. McCormick, United States ambassador to Russia, accompanied by Mrs. McCormick, arrived at Hot Springs, Ark.

Orders have been issued at the navy department directing Rear Admiral Jewell from command of the European station Nov. 19, he having applied for retirement after forty years' service.

Rev. Logan Herbert Root, an acerbated bishop of Hankow, China, is Emmanuel Episcopal church, Boston.

The new bishop, elected at the recent general convention, succeeds Rt. Rev. J. Addison Ingie, who died within two years after his consecration in 1902.

The Earl, H. L. board of trade adopted a resolution asking for the appointment of Prof. Pearson of Cornell university as chief of the dairy division of the department of agriculture.

A window memorial of the late President Benjamin Harrison will be unveiled next Sunday in the First Presbyterian church of Indianapolis, which President Harrison was a ruling elder for many years.

RUSSO-JAPANESE WAR NEWS

NOV. 13, 1904. Think Cidalis Has Fallen—Britons believe Port Arthur has fallen, but can get no news.

Not Ready for Intervention—France ascertains time for intervention in the war has not yet come.

Kuroki Is Dead—Gen. Kuroki was struck by a splinter from a bursting shell and died in Lao-Yang Oct. 4, according to a dispatch from Nemirovich Danchenko, a Russian correspondent in Mukden.

Rumors of Succession—Danchenko states that Gen. Nodzu took charge of the Japanese eastern army on the death of Kuroki, but rumors are current that Siasandri, a kinsman of the mikado, will be commander.

Tunnel—Japanese build tunnels to within 100 yards of the main forts at Port Arthur, and are in a position to stop the work without losing a man in the advance.

Bombard Port Arthur—Battle is doing enormous damage to the harbor at Port Arthur. Japanese bombarded harbor Nov. 9 and 10, damaging battleship Peresviet and cruiser Bayan.

Armies in Deadlock—Japanese and Russian forces in seeming deadlock along the Shakhe river; armies entrenched within few hundred paces of each other.

Cruiser on Rocks—Reports reach Tokio that the Russian cruiser Grozobol of the Vladivostok harbor recently and narrowly escaped sinking.

Does Little Damage—A dispatch dated "General Kuroki's headquarters" states that the Russian fire at Port Arthur has done little damage to the Japanese.

Repel Russians—Japs repel two Russian attacks on line south of Mukden.

Raise Jap Tariff—Japan decides to increase the tariff on its imports to raise war funds.

Seek Weak Spots—Russian scouting attacks on Japanese left army indicate that Kuropatkin is seeking weak spots in the lines in order to deliver a heavy blow.

Fear Move on Mukden—St. Petersburg thinks that the Japanese have received heavy reinforcements, and are preparing to move on Mukden.

Japs Are Active—Mukden reports that the signs of a new engagement are increasing and that the Japs are active.

Fears Russia in India—Lord Seely fears Russia in India—American investors eagerly subscribe to the new Japanese loan.

Underground Battle—The Japanese forces before Port Arthur by a sudden attack gain the mounts of several forts and capture the garrisons.

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Shell of Russian Make—British inquiry into the attack on the North Sea offshoot by the Russian squadron begins in Hull, and the evidence shows an entire absence of a Japanese shell.

Takes Refuge at Chefoo—A Russian torpedo-boat destroyer escaped from Port Arthur and reached Chefoo, where it may be seized by Japs.

Message From Mikado—Prince Fushimi of Japan prepared a kindly message from the mikado to President Roosevelt.

Can Withstand Siege—Gen. Stoessel's Woman Dead—Negro Assailant.

Doylestown, Pa., dispatch: Mrs. William Copeland, wife of a farmer at Plumsteadville, had a fierce struggle with a negro assailant.

Woman Burns to Death. Greensburg, Pa., dispatch: Mrs. Samuel Riley, 40 years old, was burned to death in a fire which destroyed her home.

PROFESSORS OF GL-SAXONS

English Statesman Says Great Britain and United States Will Lead.

FOR PROGRESS OF THE WORLD Expects the Two Great Nations to Join Hands for the Advancement of Civilization of Mankind—Election Impresses.

New York dispatch: John Morley, the English statesman, was one of the speakers at the annual dinner of the New York chamber of commerce.

He declared he was as enthusiastic as any one in the world on the night of the election when he made a tour of the voting booths and visited the newspaper offices to see how the returns were handled.

He predicted that the United States and Great Britain would be found fighting side by side.

"I confess it greatly impressed my imagination," said Mr. Morley, "and stirred me to think that in this vast country within a few hours the voice of the people, right or wrong, would be so emphatically and so unmistakably ascertained."

"Frankly, I rejoice to hear from the secretary of the treasury that your boys are today, if you had taken that struck me most in my rapid transit through important trade centers in this country."

"Well, if that is all the tendency that comes of testifying I do not think I need have taken the trouble to have testified, because I gather that a good many of you all create have some doubts as to the matter."

"It would be most unbecoming of me to say a word as to the personal opinions of any individual in passing that it is gratifying to me to find that a man may write a book about Oliver Cromwell and yet be a good man and one who respects the destinies of a nation."

"I desire to think, and I do think, that in the great questions and emergencies that are before Great Britain and the United States will both be interested and by sentiment be focused by side."

"I believe from the bottom of my heart that for the progress of the world, for the civilization of mankind, and for the good of our race, that these ideals and those questions which are common to us and common to you."

Mr. Morley's speech was received with the loudest applause and lasted ten minutes before the applause subsided.

The other speakers of the evening were Lewis M. Shaw, secretary of the treasury; Richard Olney and Sir James Kitson, M. P. Morris K. Jessup presided.

Secretary Shaw in his address said money is plenty, crops abundant and prices good, and on this account warned the business world against either "reckless optimism" or "blind pessimism."

Cleveland, O., dispatch: Dr. Chas. Ludlow, a physician of this city, who was drugged and robbed of \$2,000 and found unconscious near Washington, in Davis county, has been brought home.

Farmer in Turkey Trust. Albany, N. Y., dispatch: Warred county farmers, who raise great numbers of turkeys for the eastern markets, have formed a trust here.

Will Sail Around Bridge. Toledo, Ohio, special: Roy Knabenbeck, of Ahio, Aracel, will sail the Arrow over and under the Brooklyn bridge. He will attempt the feat early in the spring.

ATTEMPTS TO KIDNAP LONE WOMEN AT NIGHT

Man Picks Up His Victims at Omaha, but Releases Them When They Scream for Assistance.

Omaha, Neb., dispatch: Detectives are searching for a man who has made several unsuccessful attempts to kidnap well-known women of this city.

Miss Helen Pickett, daughter of a prominent citizen, was returning from a neighbor's house at night when a huge man stopped her and, picking her up and tucking her under his arm, tried to carry her away.

She screamed and the man released her. She was rescued by a neighbor who was passing by.

Another woman was kidnaped in the street, picked up and carried off by a strange man, but cried for help and was rescued by a policeman.

CHANGES IN ARMY UNIFORMS. Letters "U. S." Will Replace Coat of Arms on Collars June 1.

Washington dispatch: The secretary of war has caused orders to be issued for changes in the uniform of the army.

The letters "U. S." instead of the coat of arms will take effect June 1, 1905. The cap prescribed is intended for habitual wear in the garrison with the service uniform.

ENFORCES ANTI-LIQUOR RULE Northern Pacific Road Quits Nearly 100 Employees for Drinking.

St. Paul, Minn., dispatch: The stringent anti-liquor rule that has been put in effect on the Montana division of the Northern Pacific has had its first demonstration.

Three engineers, eight firemen and two civil engineers and several foremen and yardmasters were summarily discharged for drinking.

Chicago, Ill., dispatch: Jacob H. Plain, former cashier of the German-American National bank of Aurora, Ill., charged with embezzlement, misapplying funds and making false entries upon the books of the bank, was taken before Judge Humphreys.

Dress Catches in Chain and She Is Dragged to Death. Stockton, Cal., dispatch: Miss Anna Duddick of this city, aged 22 years, was killed in an automobile accident.

Alien Attempt to Poison. Houghton, Mich., dispatch: John G. Stockley of Calumet has been arrested on a charge of attempting to poison his brother-in-law and his neighbors, by concealing Paris green in cabbage growing on the latter's farm.

Footpad Gets \$100. Sterling, Ill., dispatch: Albert Wenslerberg was held up and robbed of \$100 in the business district of Sterling at 9 o'clock at night.
