SAVING CROPS FRCM STORMS

Scientist Believes He Can Successfully Do This.
Let Jap and Russ fight their fellows. Herr Stiger of the meteorological bureau of Vienna battles with the clouds. In almost every country on the continent where agriculture is the people's mainstay there is a systematic use of scientific warfare with cloud shouling cannon for the purpose of dispelling threatened hall storms. Herr Stiger began his experiments with the fundamental principle of disstippelling threatened hall storms. Herr Stiger began his experiments with the fundamental principle of disturbing the intense stillness which prevails before a haltstorm. He demonstrated the fact that after the firing of a shot a small whirlwind arises easily perceptible in the reflected sunshine. The most marked effects were produced by horizontal shots. For the experiments, shelds built of thick paper and linen were placed at intervals of from forty to 100 yards from the mouth of the cannon. When the circle of wind enfolded these shelds they were torn from the frames, the solid posts and frames, from eighteen to twenty-two yards, while a large mastiff standing near was whifed into the air, turned several somersaults, and was flung to the ground lifeless.

It is beginning to look as if the projected tunnel under Behring strait to unite the railroad systems of the two continents might become a reality, although it has been more or less scoffed at as the impracticable idea of a dreamer.
