Weak Postal Routes.

Commenting upon the plan of the postoffice department to discontinue many of the rural free delivery routes where the number of mail parcels do not average up to the standard required by the government, the Atlanta Constitution says: Speaking for these weak little routes of Georgia and of the other southern states, the Constitution would urge the very best reasons from the rural people themselves.

No body undertakes to deny the happy influence of rural free delivery. Many of these routes that make such a poor showing when it comes to counting their mail pieces have in fact established, and left to progress at the same ratio of improvement they will one day make their routes self supporting.

Newspapers in China.

It is rather interesting to note just at this time that China at present seems to be passing through much the same process with its newspapers and other publications that many parts of the United States have passed through.

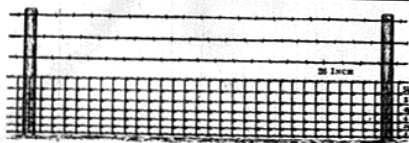
