## ARE AFTER BETTER ROADS

The State Highway Commis Secures the Co-Operation of the Post Office Department

In order to secure satisfactory information as to the condition of the public roads in all parts of the state, and at all security of the state, and at all security of the state, and at all security of the year, the State Highway Commission has sought the cooperation of the post office department as one of the best means to collect this information. In response to a request from A. N. Johnson, state highway engineer, the fourth assistant postumater general sent a letter to all the postuments in the state, asking them to great lip-formation at leader when the condition of the rural tage delivery routes. Within a few days a circular letter and blank will be sent to each of the carriers, asking questions concerning the condition of the roads which they travel.

It is believed that the information thus collected by the State Highway Commission, overling as it will such close observation on about two-throst of the total mileage of the roads of the state, will prove a valuable aid in suggesting the proper methods of improving the endition of the roads in any particular locality. The advice of the commission will thus be based on a wide and accurate knowledge of actual conditions.

The method adopted by the State Highway Cosmission to secure this information is of special interest, as it is believed that this is the first time where so complete and extensive a canvass of the road conditions of any state has been under in so thorough and at the same time in so practical and inexpensive a manner, and it shows, moreover, the live interest taken by the post office department in road improvement.
