Havana.— The insurgents in the province of Pinar Del Rio captured their first city there Wednesday. At nine o'clock in the morning the force led by Pino Guerra, an ex-congressman and an infuential man, who was thought to be many miles eastward, and sundry other insurgent bands attacked San Luis, which is situated on the railroad, about ten miles west of Pinar Del Rio City. A sharp and decisive engagement followed during which a number of men were killed or wounded. The town was defended by less than 100 rurni guards, 50 or whom surrendered to the insurgents and many control of the railroad stating its normal condition. Congress are expends 1241,062 a year line trings wary the congress are expends 1241,062 a year line trings wary the congress are divided into 40,000,000 packets so that the packets cost about half a cent aceh. But as a large part of the appropriation is expended in clerk hire, packeting the seed in a packet is much less than half a cent.
