

FOUND DEAD IN HOTEL

MYSTERIOUS MURDER CASE AT MINNEAPOLIS.

YOUNG WOMAN IS VICTIM

Couple Register as Fred Tyler and Wife, But Man is Grown When Attendants Discover Body of His Companion.

Minneapolis.—Minneapolis police are confronted by another mysterious murder, which promises to develop many sensations as did that of Millie Ellison, who was murdered at the National hotel, a few months ago.

At five o'clock Wednesday afternoon attendants at the Greenleaf hotel on Hennepin avenue, broke into a room which had been occupied by a couple who registered on Tuesday as Fred Tyler and wife, and found on the bed the dead body of a beautiful young woman. Blood was coming from a wound in the top of the head, and apparently she had been dead for several hours. It is said that the man who accompanied her to the hotel in the early afternoon, but no one can give an accurate description of him.

The woman apparently was of the better class, her appearing being of elegant material and fashionable model and her face and hands giving evidence of refinement. Nothing was found to positively identify her identity, it being the police theory that the couple registered under assumed names. Her shoes bore the mark of a fashionable St. Paul shop and her linen was marked with a name which bore the shop mark of a St. Paul laundry.

The body was at once taken to the morgue where an autopsy was held. It was found that death was caused by a bullet which had entered into the top of her head. A possible motive for the crime was developed by the autopsy, which disclosed that the woman was enceinte.

HEARST NAMED FOR GOVERNOR

Democrats of New York Select Publisher to Head Ticket.

Buffalo.—On a platform written by W. Bourke Cockran, which denounces centralization of private enterprise in the hands of government and which extends felicitations to William J. Bryan without saying anything about the presidency, William R. Hearst was nominated for governor by the New York Democratic state convention.

With Hearst two of the other candidates of the league of league for lieutenant governor and secretary of state—also were nominated by the Democrats.

Only a single ballot was taken on the governorship. Hearst receiving 309 votes, Congressman William Sulzer 124 and John A. Dix 17.

Saratoga, N. Y.—The Republican state convention met here Wednesday, nominated a state ticket, adopted a platform and then adjourned.

Charles E. Senator Tully, of Steuben county, seconded the nomination, and it was made by acclamation.

A DANGEROUS PRACTICE.

Burning Off Paint Makes Insurance Void.

It seems that considerable danger to property exists in the practice of burning off old paint before re-painting. The question has long been a subject of debate in the technical journals, and now householders and the newspapers have begun to discuss it. Those of us who, with trembling, have watched the painters blow a fiery blast from their lances against our houses, and have looked sadly at the state of our painting bill because of the time wasted on this preliminary work, are interested in the investigation by the Greenleaf (Mass.) Gazette and Courier, which gives considerable space to the reasons for the practice, questions its necessity and suggests ways to prevent the risk of burning down one's house in order to get the old paint off. It says:

"There is a good deal of discussion among house owners as to the desirability, in painting houses of burning off the old paint, a practice that has grown very common of late in Greenleaf and elsewhere. Insurance men are strongly opposed to this method. It makes void insurance policies for fires caused in this manner. Several houses in Greenleaf have gotten afire as the result of this method, and in some places houses have burned as a result."

"It is undoubtedly true that when a house has been painted over and over again there comes to be an accumulation of paint in the pores of the old paint, a practice that has grown very common of late in Greenleaf and elsewhere. Insurance men are strongly opposed to this method. It makes void insurance policies for fires caused in this manner. Several houses in Greenleaf have gotten afire as the result of this method, and in some places houses have burned as a result."

"The Gazette and Courier quotes certain old patrons to the effect that accumulation of paint is unnecessary. These old-timers lay the blame partly on the painter who fails to brush his paint in well, partly on the custom of painting in damp weather or not allowing sufficient drying between successive coats, and partly to the use of adulterated paints instead of old-fashioned linseed oil and pure white lead. The paper says:

"Many of the old householders say that if care is taken at all these points it is absolutely unnecessary to have paint burned off. They advise that people who have houses painted should buy their own materials, and to have them put on by the day, so as to be sure to get good lead and oil. Of course the burning off of paint greatly increases the cost of the job."

The trouble householders everywhere have with paint is pretty well summed up by our contemporary, and the causes are about the same everywhere. They are the most frequent cause of burning old paint is the use of poor material. The oil should be pure linseed and the white lead should be real white. The latter is often tampered with than the oil. Earthy substances, and pulverized rock and quartz, are frequently used as cheapeners, to the great detriment of the paint.

Painters rarely advertise white lead themselves and they very seldom use ready prepared paints—the most frequent causes of paint trouble. But they do advertise white lead because the property owner insists on a low price and the painter has to economize somewhere. The suggestion is therefore a good one that the property owner investigate the subject a little, find out the name of some reliable brand of white lead, and see that the keg is marked with that name.

The linseed oil is more difficult to be sure of, as it is usually sold in bulk when the quantity is small; but reliable makers of linseed oil can be ascertained by inquiry, and if your dealer is reliable, you will get what you want. Pure white lead and linseed oil are so necessary to good paint that the little trouble necessary to get them well typed on the house owner in dollars a cents saved.
