OPENING THE "BIG PASTURE." Bids Being Received for Half Million Oklahoma Acres.

Lawton, Okla-The government land office here has begun receiving bids for half a million acres of land in the Klows, Comanche and Apache reservations in Oklahoma, carrying out an act of congress opening the land to settlement. The land is spoken of as the "big pasture." Most of it is good for farming purposes. Under the law no bids of less than five dollars an acre will be considered and each bidder may put in as many proposals as he desires. The maximum amount of land to be sold to any pidder, however, will be limited to a single quarter section. It is believed that there will be 30,000 bidders.
