SHATTER SAFE IN OFFICE. WANT STRONGER REBATE LAW.

Bold Work of Burglars in Town of Farmerville. Life Insurance Men Would Have the Receiver Punished.

Farmerville.—One of the boldest robberies ever perpetrated in this section was that of a gang of safe-blowers who shattered the safe of the post-office in this city at one o'clock on the morning of Dec. 4.

Chicago.—The general agents and agency managers of life insurance companies met to consider the subject of rebating. It was declared that agents of one or two companies are giving away most of their commission, as the companies give a bonus for a stipulated amount of insurance to be written.
