THE HIGH SCHOOL ENTERTAINMENT

Pupils of the Barrington High School Entertain a Large Audience With an Exceptionally Fine Entertainment on Friday Evening of Last Week.

Standing room was at a premium at the entertainment given in assembly room of the new school house Friday evening of last week by the pupils of the High school.

Three farces were given, entitled "I Think So," "Too Much of a Good Thing," each one act, and "Truth Crushed to Earth," in three acts.

Space will not permit us to call attention to each and every character to the extent to which they are entitled, but in "I Think So," Messrs. Ploger, Gieske and Froelich made a decided hit.

In "Too Much of a Good Thing," Misses Powers, Landwer and Girls and Messrs. Collins, Powers and Gottschalk did so well in portraying the trials and tribulations of an Irishman just landed in New York that the audience was kept roaring with laughter from beginning to end.

The third play, "Truth Crushed to Earth," proved most novel in more ways than one. Probably the biggest hit, however, was made in the impersonation of "The Witch" by Ira Effink and "Rosario" by Lorette Bennett. Circuit court convened Thursday at Waukegan at one o'clock, with Judge Charles Donnelly on the bench. It is now the March or spring term of court as many supposed, but is a mere adjournment of the December term. It was expected that the adjournment of the term would take place late Thursday afternoon. The court was occupied by hearing motions and the general routine work for closing a term. One of the first things taken up was the motion for a new trial in the case of Mrs. Bertha Kropp against her father-in-law, in which she sued for alienation of her husband's affections. It is recalled at the last session of court, the jury gave a verdict for Mrs. Kropp for \$2,500. The defense moved for a new trial and a few arguments were made Thursday while Judge Donnelly overruled.
