Shifting Responsibility.

The disbonneted discharge of a battalion of United States soldiers for the crimes of a few of their comrades seems to be a method of shifting responsibility from the officers in charge of the troops to the shoulders of those who, whatever their shortcomings, possess in the highest degree that fidelity to the corps which in the long run makes the efficient man at arms. Officers of battalions and companies are supposed to keep their men in hand at all times, and the more they are prone to will conduct when killing around camp the more alert their commanders should be. The wholesale discharge of innocent members of the Twenty-fifth regiment because they refused to talk for their comrades is a most unfortunate affair for the whole army as well as for the victims of the drastic discipline.

To be suddenly deprived of a good army record, won by years of service in a company which means but soldiers can fully understand. For what a soldier must endure the pay however liberal, is but scanty return. He longs to even up with a record of "good soldier" on his descriptive list and a certificate of honorable discharge on a parchment bearing the eagle. Another feature of the service is peculiar. A soldier takes his place in a little family of 50 or 100 men and from the very start is taught that he must stand by his comrades in camp as well as in battle. He must never tell tales, never seek the advantage for himself, never shrink any duty common to the crowd. He must so conduct himself that he can stand face to face daily with about the same men year after year. He will openly denounce and even shoot down the comrade who betrays the dog, but the traitor to company traditions he will rebuke in private to save feelings.

Samuel Flower has leased from the Board of Education the property at 23 to 31 West Madison street, 84,556, for 60 years at an annual rental of twenty years at \$2,040, the balance of the term, \$3,550. The lessee agrees to construct a first class fire-proof building to cost not less than \$20,000. The Board of Education agrees to take the building at the end of the term at actual cash value, as determined by an appraisal.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that bids will be received for the furnishing and laying of the connected system of six inch cast iron water supply pipes in Cook Street from Russell Street to South Limits Street, and a connected system of four inch cast iron water supply pipes in Station Street from Hough Street to Cemetery Street, together with hydrants, valves and valve boxes, and including excavating and back filling, laying pipes in lead, hemp, and all necessary labor and material to complete the work, as a whole, in accordance with the ordinance therefore, said bids will be opened on the 11th day of December, A. D. 1906, at the hour of 7:30 P. M., at the Village Hall, the office of the Board of Local Improvements of the Village of Barrington in said Village.

It would call a halt to the mad pace at which most are rushing along. It would spread the crushing work of ten or twenty or thirty years over forty or fifty years, and thus save the old man a great deal of trouble. We should not see the sad spectacle of men of high mental and moral character for boys and youths, who can be obtained for less money and who have more physical force—though not always that. The quieter and safer life among a great body of Christian people would have a calming influence upon the rest.

And, further, this unworthy manner of living does not imply that Christians were poor, as that word is generally understood. Their wealth, as they lay up treasures on earth, would tend to simplify life, purify of idle, pompous and unproductive and unproductive, and makes no sense. It is not the money that counts, but the character and the life that counts. The church of Christ has always inclined toward some form of "communism" or "socialism." This author agrees, but he goes to a very high plane of economic thought when he declares that "men and women are the real capital." To quote further:

A nation that has a large body of men who do not enter into competition to be rich, but are models of industry, frugality, honesty, temperance, would soon feel a new organizing force at work within her. Every kind of industry would be reformed.

But without our great "expansions of industry" without our great cities, how would much of the world's enterprise be maintained? What matters require attention in our churches and in our nation, and unless they are attended to soon we may find that the world's enterprise, so far as we are concerned, cannot be extended to all. "The white man's burden" is heavy, too heavy for our strength. Let him recruit himself; spare did will do him good; his disease springs mostly from enlargement of dividends.
