## PASS TO GREAT BEYOND

Four Well Known People in this Community Departed this Life During the Past Few Days.

**CHARLES WILLE**  
After a lingering illness with consumption covering nearly two years, Charles Wille, a resident of this village, passed away at his home Tuesday night at ten o'clock surrounded by all his family. The family had just moved into their new home on Applebee street Monday, and it was hoped that his recovery would begin. He is a native of Germany, born August 4, 1864, and emigrated with his parents to America when seven years old. Most of his life was spent in or near this village. On June 9th, 1892 he was married to Miss Emma Groff, who now, with the four children of the home mourns their loss. The names of the children are: Laura, Raymond, James, and Mrs. Elsie Anderson of Lake Zurich. He was confirmed in the Lutheran faith and was a member of that church. He was a member of Lake Zurich Camp, 697, M. W. A. Under the direction of the Woodmen he was sent to the Colorado Springs sanitarium in May last year, when for a while he seemed to improve in health. After six months stay there it was found necessary for him to seek a lower altitude, and he returned to his home in Barrington October 1, 1911.

He had been a resident of Lake Zurich for the past 12 years and the last three years he conducted the Lake Home Hotel. He moved to Barrington last September.

Besides the family he leaves one sister, Mrs. Mary Sternberg of Elgin, and two teachers, Mrs. W. L. G. Chicago Highlands, and Fred Wille of Gillet, Wisconsin.

The funeral services will be held in charge of the pastor, Rev. H. Thoren Friday afternoon, at one o'clock at the home, and 1300 at Salem church. It is expected that the Woodmen will take part in the services at the cemetery.

**ANN MARSHALL**  
Ann Koewles was born in Maidstone, County of Kent, England, January 29, 1834 and died at her home in this village last Saturday, aged 78 years.

She came to America with two sisters in 1858 and resided in Chicago for twenty years. Her father died in England and her mother in the United States.

She married Squire Marshall in 1860 and in 1868, after the death of their son Benjamin Marshall, the family moved to this village where they have since resided.

Besides her husband she leaves surviving four children, Robert Marshall of Michigan, Sidney, Anna and Cole residing in Mississippi and California. There are also five grand-children.

## DR. SHEPARD FOR EPISCOPACY.

The Quadrangular Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church opened its Session at Minneapolis Yesterday.

The general conference of the Methodist Episcopal church opened yesterday in Minneapolis. It will remain in session for the month of May. It is composed of about 500 delegates, representing many nationalities, from almost all quarters of the world. It meets once in four years. Among the important things coming up for consideration, will be the election of bishops and editors, and other general officers. Great pressure will be brought to bear to secure the election of a colored bishop for work among colored people in the south.

The question of the time limit for the pastorate will be considered, as some favor going back to the old way of a limit of ten or five years. It does not seem likely that this will prevail. The amusement question will also be canvassed, with a possible restatement of the case. The Rock River conference sends fourteen delegates including one woman. Dr. W. O. Shepard, whose wife is a delegate, and includes Harrington, a delegate, and is spoken of as a quite possible prominent candidate for the episcopacy.

Rev. W. B. Norton will report for the Chicago Tribune and Rev. W. H. Carwardine for the Chicago Examiner. These reports will be reliable.

Four companies organized for the refining of beet sugar are now seeking locations in Lake county, each company offering negotiations whereby they may gain control of tracts of land upon which to construct factories.

From Elgin comes the announcement that an official of the Knickerbocker Ice company states that notwithstanding the fact that the ice crop this year far exceeds that of previous years, the price of ice will remain the same during 1912.

At a meeting of the board of directors of the Home for aged and Disabled Railroad Men held at the home at Highland Park, recently plans for a huge addition to the home were discussed and arrangements made for the raising of \$60,000 to build the structure.
