Whatever the reason the are quite successful in attracting at tention to themselves, and often curses. If a horse or team appears to be fright ened, instead of trying to be as quiet as possible they invariably open the muf-fler, give a few unnecessary toots of the horn and put on a little more speed. the clutch, they open the muffler and speed the engine up for five or ten minutes so that everybody will know they are about. All this is unneces sary, annoying and sometimes danger ous, and doubtless will result in a statewide law against the practice if it is continued much longer.
