HITS PART OF THE PEOPLE

Governor Herner has gone to great effort to show that the 2 per cent ax is an occupational and not a sales tax. That is an admittance of the very thing with which citizens have found fault. It is AN OCCUPATIONAL TAX, but just what is an occupational tax?

We do not believe a general definition is necessary, but a definition of the Illinois occupational tax might accurately be stated "a tax, on the gross income of part of the people." It is a tax on the gross income of those unfortunate individuals who own retail stores or stock in retail stores. It is true the law previous that the tax may be passed on to the consuming public through increased prices for merchandise. Prices can be ceiveniently increased on some merchandise but not on other merchandise, and the law does not and can not alter this fagt in any way.

No doubt the property owners will welcome a cut in tax levy because of the revenue raised through the occupational tax. Bit they should remember that someone must provide that revenue.

If the occupational tax were levied on gross receipts from all occupations whether retail, wholesale, professional, trade work or what not, it would be a lot more equitable. After all, the butcher should not be forced to pay a gross income tax if the lawyer escapes it; the grocer should not be forced to pay a gross income tax if the doctor escapes it; the hardware delair should not be rored to pay if the handware delair should not be rored to pay if the plumber is exempt; the tobacco store proprietor should not have to pay if the bank clerk is exempt; the news stand owner should not have to pay if the bank clerk is exempt; the news tax and owner should not have to pay if the carpenter is exempt, and the seller of automobiles should not have to pay if the methanic who works for him is exempt.
