Pulse Rate A newborn infant's pulse rate is 130 to 140 a minute. In the first year this is reduced to 115 to 130. In the third year the rate is from 95 to 110, and from the seventh to the fourteenth, the rate in adult life, while in old age it slows down to 70 to 75.

One of First Steamships Of the early steamships designed to carry huge cargoes and many passengers, a notable example was the Great Eastern. This ship, one of the first vessels ever built as a steamship, was completed in England in 1857. Originally designed to inaugurate a line between England and Australia, the Great Eastern never made such a voyage, because its engines were not sufficiently powerful. The ship was used, however, in laying the first transatlantic cable.
