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All Farmers Must Fill Out Corn-Hog Production Sheets

Community Meeting on Farm Plan at Arlington Heights February 6

Every farmer in Cook county must fill in a corn and hog production work sheet, even though he does not sign a contract to reduce his corn and hog production, according to an announcement from the extension service of the College of Agriculture, University of Illinois, reported by farm adviser O. G. Greer.

It is important, Mr. Greer pointed out, that every farmer attend the county big educational meetings in his community. The work sheets will be distributed at these meetings and also for filling in the blanks available.

Community meetings have been scheduled as follows: Blue Island, Jan. 26, 8 p. m.; Chicago, Jan. 27, 8 p. m.; Arlington Heights, village hall, Mon., Feb. 6 at 7:30 p. m.; Elmhurst, Park school, Wednesday, Feb. 7, 8 p. m.; Elmhurst, Park school, Wednesday, Feb. 8, 8 p. m.; Lyons township, Pharesville school, Feb. 9, 10 p. m.; Plainfield, Feb. 9, at 8:30 p. m.

Some people have the opinion that the farmer does not need to sign a corn-hog contract and because of this the benefit payments allocated through the agricultural adjustment administration, he need not pay attention to the campaign now being waged.

This is not correct, says the college extension service. Before the program can be fully completed and benefits made to those who cooperate, the county allotment committee must obtain a work sheet for every farm in Cook county. This work sheet is a report of the crop production of the farm in 1932 and 1933, the extent of hog production and sale during the year, the period and a report of the utilization of the corn crop during that period.

Residents of Barrington township received their 1933 personal property assessment schedule, Wednesday, Jan. 24, 1934. The assessment is for 1934 being delivered in this township showing a meeting of 39 counties. The county assessors will be at the office of County Assessor J. J. Jacobs Tuesday, Jan. 25, 1934.

John Schwartz, local assessor, reported that Mr. Jacobs explained the details of their work to the deputy assessors and made arrangements for the deliveries of assessment schedules.

The towns in addition to Barrington are: Evanston, Northbrook, Hawthorn, Worth, Wheeling, St. Charles, Fremont and Riverdale. Chicago taxpayers will not receive their notices of bills of February, it was reported.

Taxpayers have ten days after receipt of schedules to fill them out and return them to the assessor's office. They fail to do this, the assessor will estimate the value of their property and add a penalty of 50 per cent to the bill. All 1933 personal property tax bills will become delinquent on January 1, 1935.
