serve for three years, two direct, two to serve for two years, and two to serve for one year. The by-laws provide that there shall be not less than seven nor more than eleven directors.  
An institution offering local persons through stock investments in the association and loans for buildings, purchasing or refinancing mortgages on homes comprise the two-fold purpose of the organization. It is planned to build up a capital stock for investment of \$25,000. As the association is eligible for federal loans through the Federal Home Loan bank of Chicago equal to the paid-in capital stock, the association will have a total loan fund of \$50,000 when the present capital stock structure is completed. Loans will be made on the direct reduction plan.  
Three types of stock shares will be sold including installment (with optional savings and prepayment),

**Latta Tops Bronk Scoring With 126 Points for Season**

Eugene Latta, sophomore center, was the leading scorer of the Broncho basketball team in the season just ended with a total of 126 points. He was closely followed by Earl Eiters who counted 113 and Claude Conn who made 102 points. In 18 games the Bronchos scored 539 points, an average of almost 30 points a game while their opponents totaled 410, an average of 22.7 points per game.

The Broncho cagers had a very successful season as a team winning 14 and losing only 4 games meanwhile cutting in on their second Northwest conference championship under Coach P. E. Clark. Five regulars, Conn, Eiters, Latta, Workman, and Mollenkamp will be back next year and it looks like another good season in 1934-35. ### Advise Relief Men to Register With Clerk of Village

CWA Will Disband in Week; Nedy May Get FERA Jobs

With many needy persons already out of work because of the gradual cutting down of CWA and with others facing the prospect of no work when the entire CWA is disbanded the last of next week, plan is underway to 'take care of the most needy men of the community through the federal emergency relief administration.

According to present indications the village hall project will get completed until after about the 15th week in April. The boys' work may not be completed until April 19. These will be completed through the federal emergency relief, which means that only the most needy men will be kept on the force.

A letter from CWA headquarters in Chicago, received by Corollus Snyder, local CWA official, advised men not to go to the city relief stations to ask for PWA work. The relief stations have nothing to do with PWA. The letter advised that dismissed CWA workers should still be national emergency service which will do everything possible to find them jobs. They can apply directly to contractors hired for PWA work, or to the PWA office, but not to the city relief stations.

The chief resource of dismissed CWA workers who are ineligible for relief lies in the returning activity of business in general.

Local P. T. A. Makes Final Effort to Survive; Will Hold Elections Monday

He attended St. Paul's church and was a member of the younger set. He is survived by his parents and four brothers, Jack, Ray, Henry and Edmund.

Funeral services will be held Sunday at 3 p. m. at the home at 2 o'clock at St. Paul's church. Rev. Herman Koehnig will officiate.
