WHAT'S GOING ON IN BARRINGTON

Government loans to industry on their way. One plan for federal business and trade with... The bill pending before congress would give the reconstruction finance corporation the right to go into the general banking business either in cooperation or competition with commercial banks.

Cooperating in a state wide movement to urge legislators to divert some of the indirect tax receipts, such as from sales of gasoline and tangible personal property, to the local school funds, throughout the state without increasing the rates of any of these taxes. The Review on March 8 sent telegraphic messages to this effect to three representatives and one senator from the seventh and eighth districts. Representative Emmet McGrath and Anna Wilmarth Ickes failed to answer the messages and state their positions on this subject.

Senator Ray Padlock with the following message: "Barrington Review: Your telegram expressing your views regarding pending school legislation received. It seems to be the general feeling, as I find it with many members of the senate, to believe, as the schools of their difficulties by enacting legislation that will provide funds from the liquor revenue, or the sales tax revenue, rather than to increase property tax. This is provided for in house bill No. 107, of senate bill No. 56."

Representative Richard J. Lyons replied as follows: "Editor, Barrington Review: I have your telegram of recent date and not only will consider your suggestion, but I heartily concur with your views that we cannot increase taxes and we should oppose any boost in the sales tax or the occupational sales tax. In my judgement the monies for school purposes should be diverted from the present liquor taxes and the income from the sales tax instead of increasing the burden in any way. The sales tax money was allocated for political purposes in my judgement, in an attempt to nullify property owners into the idea that they are receiving a reduction in their property tax bill. The fact is that the average small home owner and the farmer will receive a reduction in his state taxes of about \$4 or \$5 per year, while on the other hand, he will pay out of the other pocket, \$20 to \$25 per year in the form of a sales tax, the benefits of which go only to the tremendous estates and not to the small home owners or the farmers. I will vigorously oppose any additional burden at this time."

"Permit me also to congratulate you upon your brilliant editorials in regard to the tax situation and in regard to the sales tax. I read them—every one—and they are highly instructive. Thanking you for your interest which I believe every newspaper should have that is interested in the welfare of the community and with all best wishes, I am very truly yours, Richard J. Lyons."
