Ralph E. Church, of Church and Traxler, lawyers, 10 South LaSalle Street, Chicago, lives with his wife and three children at 300 Church street, Barrington. He was born on a farm in Vermilion County, Illinois, on May 11, 1883. He earned his way through the University of Michigan (A. B., 1907) and Northwestern University (A. M. and LL. B., 1909).

In 1916, Ralph Church was first elected to the Illinois Assembly without any factional support of any kind. He was re-elected for seven more successive terms with ever-increasing majorities. In 1930 he received the largest vote ever cast for an Illinois state representative. He has been chairman of the Committee on Judicial Department and Practice and also of the Elections Committee, as well as a ranking member of the Judiciary, Revenue, and other important committees.

In April, 1932, Ralph Church won the Republican nomination for representative in Congress from the Tenth District, according to the results of the official canvass and the actual recount of all ballots properly marked by the voters. This nomination was taken from him in September of an indefensible judicial decision which disfranchised 321 conscientious voters in a single precinct.

Mr. Church was then forced to run as an independent Republican, and he polled more than 45,000 votes in the face of every possible handicap.

Now he again seeks the Republican nomination for the same office, which was rightfully his in 1932, in the primaries on April 10.
