Colorful Street Parade Will Be Staged Saturday

A colorful parade of boy scout scouts, campfire girls, members of the cast of "Henry's Wedding" led by the high school band will march through the streets of Barrington Saturday afternoon. The parade will be given at the Catlow the night Wednesday and Thursday. Intentional floats will be in the color of the parade.

The line of march has been planned as follows: starting at Cook and Station street, to Park Grove intersection, west on Park to Cook, north on Cook to Hough street, east on Main to Elm, north on Elm to Lake, west on Lake to Hough, south on Hough to Russell, on Russell to Cook, north on Cook to Lake, west on Lake to Hough, north on Hough to Station, on Station to Cook.
