The only strictly local names to come before the voters will be those of party precinct committees. Cornelius C. Snyder and Frank Treutler are candidates for the democratic position in Cuba township. Mr. Snyder is the present committeeman who was elected for the first time two years ago. Mr. Treutler is a local real estate dealer. Both are well known to the voters. Joseph Weller, the republican committeeman in Cuba township and will be unopposed for re-nomination.

Local committeemen In three precincts of Barrington township the three republican committeemen will be unopposed. They are J. C. Plagge, first precinct; William Kruntus, second precinct; and Henry Solt, third precinct. Radolph Koehler, democratic committeeman is unopposed in the first precinct of Mr. Loomis in the second. Good Warner and Arthur Callow are opposed for the committeeman job in the third precinct.

Local county republican vote will help nominate two candidates of each for eighth district representative. Three candidates seem to have an edge on the others, but at present they are running close enough to make it a narrow down process interesting. Richard J.
