

Many Candidates, No Campaign for Village Election

Ten Men Seek Positions Trustees; Three for Village Clerk

Village election next Tuesday will be peculiarly quiet as compared with elections of previous years due to a lack of ticket bugs and other forms of political coercion, unless some thing unexpected develops with the next three days.

The election this year appears to be an affair of individual and against individual. It has been free from mud-slinging. Over-shadowed by the county and state primaries, the election has not commanded much attention, although much interest probably will develop.

The polling place will be the Standard Motor garage on Hough street. The polls will be open from 6 a. m. to 5 p. m. A brief review of the candidates given alphabetically follows:

For Village Clerk
 A. C. Burandt has served clerk for four years and has experience as adjutant of the Barrington post, American Legion. He is owner of Burandt Book store.
 D. B. Pomeroy was village trustee for two years. He served an important paving bond issue committee and was other important committees. He was part owner of the Barrington River Mills for many years.
 A. T. Ultsch, had many years of experience as assistant cashier of the First State bank. He never before been a candidate for office.

For Village Trustee
 John H. D. Blanke was a candidate for office of trustee a year ago. Although not elected, he was given a large vote. Blanke is editor of a technical engineering magazine.
 John J. Carroll has been a trustee for four years. He made careful study of the paving situation in an effort to protect his home. He is president of the N. W. railroad engineer and has had several years experience secretary of his trade association.
 J. J. Caldwell served as village for several terms as clerk and later as president of the
