Novels About Jews to Be Reviewed

Two novels having to do with life in Germany under the Hitler regime will be reviewed at a meeting of the book review group to be held at the home of Mrs. E. Harold Holmes Thursday.

"The Oppermanns," by Lion Feuchtwanger, shows the disintegration, in varying ways, of a family of prosperous German Jews, according to Mrs. Robert Work, who will give the review. The author is a Jew, now in exile, who has written a number of successful novels.

"German Family," by L. C. N. Stone, is really a half-English family, and while many of the German characters are Jews, their encounters with the Nazis are less tragic than in "The Oppermanns." It is, on the whole, a cheerful book, even gay in the earlier part. The facts given in both books are nearly identical, but Feuchtwanger's bitter sorrow for his race and for his country burden his story with his own pain.

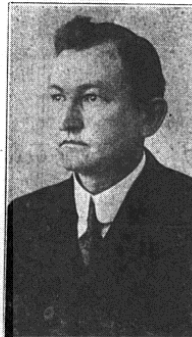

board. Most of the important improvements of the village were accomplished while he was village president. Mr. Caldwell is secretary of the Barrington Lions club.

Robert Prick served two terms on the village board of trustees in 1919 and 1920. He is well known in Barrington where he conducted a milk business for several years.

H. D. A. Grebe is the old village trustee. He is a public business man, from point of view in Barrington. He is a partner of Grebe's Hardware store. Mr. Grebe has been a candidate for office on several occasions, never failing to get a large vote.

Reuben Jahnholtz is a young man who has worked at the general trade. He is seeking office for the first time.

Herman Kuhlman is a member of the board. He was elected the first time in 1922 and since then has been active on the board and streets committees. Kuhlman has helped direct work of rebuilding the village hall.

Archie Mitchell is manager of the Jefferson Ice Co. and has been successful in building up the company's business. He is a candidate for office for the first time.

Sanford Rieke served on board for two terms, retiring in 1929. He was active on general improvement committees while a trustee. Mr. Rieke was always a strong vote getter. He is a carpenter by trade.

Henry E. Wiest is a manager at the Blumore Country club. He has been active in affairs of village and is well known. Wiest usually attends board meetings to keep informed on village matters.

The road building work will be underway the village will be about \$1500 due.

The project is included as part of the general project which village has requested from the work division of the federal emergency relief administration. No part of the labor will be supplied by the relief administration. The project is approved, although one or two men, such as a foreman, will be paid by the village.

When completed, Park avenue from Cook to Grove will be feet wide with full width pavement. It will be graded, gravelled from Grove to Summit street will be graded, gravelled from the new Park avenue intersection to Russell street. This will make an arterial heating route from Main street to Park avenue to Summit, to Summit to Hillside, and over it side to the Northwest highway.
