To Aid the Blind There were several systems of reading for the blind in existence before the invention of Braille. The earliest authentic records of the Braille letters for the blind were invented by Francesco Lana in 1784. In 1840 a writing master in Paris cast a movable type for the first use. Valentin Haüy was the first to emboss paper as a means of reading for the blind. At the beginning of the Nineteenth century 23 different methods of embossing printing were in existence. With the Moon type, invented by Isaac Moon of Brighton in 1837, France and Lucas.
