Norwegian Elkhound Is Good Hunter, Watch Dog

The most ancient lineage among our domestic breed dogs, the Norwegian elkhound has in no other variety, bone and sinew. And yet it is strange that a dog with so many excellent traits to recommend it to the sportsman or home-owner should be among the least popular of our transplanted breeds.

In speaking of this dog, Bayard Boyesen, Eastern authority, says: "In Norway, until recent times, there was only one breed of dog. His skeleton was found in a stratum which geologists date 6000 B. C. and we are, therefore, safe in saying that he has come to us pure Nordic, with all his Nordic traits unaltered."

In his native land the Norwegian elkhound is still the poorest hunter of big game, especially moose, but serves his master equally well in hunting all game, even down to the lowly raccoon.

It possesses the keenest of noses, plenty of stamina and heart and is a tireless worker. A friendly disposition and staunch loyalty to his friends stamps the breed as trustworthy and companionable.

Mollusks of Varied Color Though the oyster is rather a drab creature for all its popularity, the mollusks of the tropic seas are of varied form and color. Most of them have single shells whose fancy shapes and brilliant colors have made them highly prized by collectors, and the structure of their bodies, as often as singular as the striking beauty of their shells.

There are species with a distinct head, eight or ten pairs of tentacles, and highly colored eyes that have a pupil and double iris capacity of keen vision. Colored back in the throat is a tongue armed with rows of hooked teeth, while the tongues of snails and slugs are covered with tiny teeth so numerous they are counted. Not having the protection of two shells, as has the ordinary bivalve, they close the entrance to their home with a shell plate attached to the upper surface of their foot, a foot on which they crawl about like their relatives—the garden snails.

Essey of the Prickly Pear A natural enemy of the prickly pear, an importation into Australia of as great notoriety as the rabbit, the cactoblastis insect has proved an inestimable boon. Since the insect was introduced a few years ago from the United States, it has cleared 90 per cent of what was an impenetrable mass of prickly pear in Queensland and from 50 to 100 per cent in New South Wales.

Engineers Will Draw Plans for Complete System PWA Man Says Sewer Plans Should Conform With Supreme Court Decision Plans for a greatly enlarged and more expensive sewer system will be drawn up before the village of Barrington can hope for any loan assistance from the public works administration unless the supreme court of Illinois modifies the decree of Judge Shurtleff, according to George A. DeWane, chairman of the administration, who was present at the village board meeting Monday night. He drew a none too rosy picture of Barrington's prospects for a loan. "The chief reason for the gloomy viewpoint is the fact that the plans and specifications for improving the system contemplate use of the old disposal plant at its present location which was foredoomed in Judge Shurtleff's decree already affirmed by the supreme court. The PWA will not lend money to build or improve a project foredoomed by law," he said. Mr. DeWane suggested that the village prepare two alternative plans for rebuilding the sewer. The first plan would include the present plan as a base plus additions. One addition would be a pipeline from the old disposal plant to the Fox river and the other would be the pipe line and a new disposal plant at the outlet. The supreme court has granted a rehearing of the appeal. If the final decision is in more favor than the earlier one, one of the sewerage plan additions will have to be added to the basic plans and specifications. The cost of course would greatly increase the cost and therefore the necessary amount of the loan. The village board instructed the engineering firm of Conover, Oler and Quinlan to draw up the revised or augmented plans. Mr. DeWane commented on the effect the property owners' petition would have on the public works administration. The petition asked that no loan be granted Barrington for rebuilding the sewer until after a final decision on the sewer case is handed down by the supreme court. He commented that the effect of this probably will be insignificant although a possibility exists that the administration will take the petition into consideration. The amount of money to be loaned by the PWA is limited. The number of communities asking for loans is large. Consequently the PWA will not have to force a loan on any community against the will of the people in the community to get rid of its funds.
