Tubercular Patients Can Have Proper Care at Home—R. Bosworth

Tuberculosis patients need not journey to mountains of the west nor to doctors of the east to cure their disease, as it can be successfully treated in Illinois, according to a statement recently issued by the editorial committee of the Illinois Tuberculosis association, headed by Dr. Robinson Bosworth, medical director of the municipal sanitarium at Rockford.

Many patients invest their last dollar in a pilgrimage to a new climate, believing that sunshine and air alone will provide some miraculous cure. The statement points out: Such patients would be better off in their home communities where friends, relatives or the community itself could see to it that they obtain the essentials of the cure, which are rest, fresh air, good food, and careful medical attention.

"Remember this great truth," the pamphlet warns: "The longer you stay quietly in bed in the beginning of your treatment the faster you will get well and the quicker you will be able to work again." Patients are advised to "eat three good meals every day with plenty of milk. Eat only food you know you can digest, but do not stuff yourself by overeating any or all foods."

The pamphlet warns against the use of medicines. "Usually medicines are not needed in the treatment of tuberculosis, unless the cough is troublesome, or you need some simple laxative." It says: "Some form of cod liver oil is helpful, especially during the cold months of the year."

Methods patients can use to prevent infection of others in the home are also told. They are advised to cover coughs and sneezes with paper napkins which can be burned.

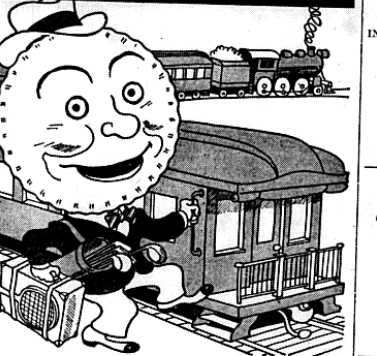

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Goodyear Builds New Tire to Meet Mileage Demand

A new automobile tire, designed to give greatly extended mileage on modern high speed automobiles has been announced by J. S. Glenside, local dealer for the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Co.
The new tire, known as the "G-3," was developed to reduce fast tread wear which has become rather common with the rapid improvement in automobile models. Some of the factors that have contributed to rapid tire wear are

reduction in wheel diameter, increased brakes and higher engine horsepower.
Long development and test work in the Goodyear laboratories and on the highways have resulted in the new "G-3" All-Weather tire which averages 43 per cent increased non-skid mileage.
The improved results were accomplished by widening and flattening the tread, increasing the number of non-skid blocks by arranging them closer together, deepening the grooves between the blocks and widening the center ribs.—Adv.

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Science Lecturer Stresses Need of Spiritual Sense

Paul Harsch of Toledo Here Tuesday to Describe Law of Goodness

In a lecture entitled "Christian Science: God's Law of Unfolded Good," Mr. Paul A. Harsch of Toledo, Ohio, who spoke at the school auditorium Tuesday evening, May 15, stated that in giving Christian Science to the world, its "Discoverer" and Founder, Mary Baker Eddy revealed the law, manifesting and law-unfolding nature of God, and he showed by argument and illustration that God's law of unfolding good has existed and unfolded eternally; that it can operate in no way opposed to its own nature, that is beneficent; and that it unfolds in consciousness simply and logically when its presence and power is recognized, and thereby establishes a right sense of health, happiness and prosperity. Throughout the lecture Mr. Harsch quoted passages from the Bible and the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy, in support of his statements.

"Christian Science," he said, "reveals God's law of good and interprets it scientifically, enabling men to use it in their everyday thought and deed." Unless a law is good—using the word in its highest sense, he went on to say—there is no law at all. That frequently that which produces, or results in, the opposite of good, a loss, suffering, discord, death—is accepted as law, is due to the fact that the nature of spiritual law has not been understood, the lecturer explained, and the unreality and impotence of so-called material law has not been recognized. Mr. Harsch, who is a member of the Board of Lecturers of the Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Massachusetts, made clear that God's creation being finished, completed in every detail, all good



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
