Summer Roundup of Children Attracts 25 to Clinic Tuesday

Twenty children were examined at the summer roundup clinic for children eligible to enter kindergarten in fall, held in the foyer of Barrington public school Tuesday afternoon, and five babies were brought to the baby clinic. A nurse from the Cook county bureau of public welfare, Chicago, assisted Dr. Deane Brooks in making examinations and weighing the children, each of whom was then given two cards for free examinations, one for eyes and the other for teeth.

Ice Cream Parlor Is Added to Burandt's Gift and Book Store

Complete soda fountain and ice cream service equipment have been installed in the Burandt Book and Gift Shop on Cook street.

Mr. Burandt has decided to discontinue the gift department of his store and confine the business to ice cream service, magazine sales, and sales of stationery, books, office supplies and equipment. The ice cream parlor will be under the management of Harry G. Munsie, formerly employed at the Pure Oil service station. Mr. Burandt will conduct the village clerk's office at the village hall.

Engineers' Plans for Widening Park Avenue Approved

Engineers' plans for widening Park avenue from Cook street to Grove avenue at a cost of \$4800 submitted at the village board meeting Monday night by Carter Jenkins, were approved by the board and forwarded to the state highway department for final approval. The cost of widening will be paid for with the village share of gas tax receipts.

Will be 15 feet wider, a street wide enough to permit parking on both sides with room for two lanes of traffic in the center. It will be necessary to grade the street five feet at the foot of Grove avenue.

Some bills for the completed village hall project have not been paid it was reported at the board meeting Monday night. The cost of materials for the project were originally reported at \$4800 half of which was to be paid by the village and half by the CWA. The village paid \$2450 and the CWA paid all but \$725 of its amount. However, additional bills totaling \$1400 were received. Because of these extra bills, the CWA delayed payment of the balance due from that administration. One of the rulings of CWA is that all local expense on a project must be paid before the CWA pays its share of material costs.
