**A Nansen Passport**  
A Nansen passport is one issued by several countries through the auspices of the League of Nations for the benefit of persons who do not have a home government which can supply them with passports. It is, of course, named for the great Norwegian statesman and philanthropist, Fridtjof Nansen, and was originally intended for White Russians; that is, adherents of the czarist regime in Russia, who were outlawed by the Soviet revolution. The scope of the Nansen passport has since been extended to other persecuted peoples, such as the Armenians.

**Danger From Lightning**  
The number of persons killed by lightning is very small in comparison with the total number of fatalities due to accidents. In the United States, the census reports show an annual average of about 500 lightning fatalities, while in a recent year there were more than 20,000 fatal accidents of all kinds. In certain circumstances of exposure to certain danger from lightning is, in general, very slight, except under certain circumstances of exposure to doors, which, as a rule, can be avoided. Within buildings of considerable size and dwelling houses of modern construction cases of death or injury by lightning are relatively rare.

## White-Necked Ravens
