## Clifford Drake, 56, Fatally Injured in Auto Accident

Former Resident Dies After Being Removed From Overturned Car

Clifford Drake, 56-year-old former resident of Barrington who had been living at Des Plaines, was fatally injured in an automobile accident about 12 miles west of Benton Harbor, Mich. Saturday afternoon. Mr. Drake was found under the car, which had overturned after hitting a stone culvert, and died a few minutes after being lifted out of the wreckage and taken to a hospital in Michigan where the accident occurred. Jack, who was driving, turned out to pass another car and the hind wheel, which were off the pavement caught so as to throw the automobile against a cement pillar, causing it to turn over three times and come to a standstill with the wheels in the air. The son was thrown into the air about 25 feet and Mr. Drake pinned under the car. Motorists righted the car and helped Mr. Drake to a sitting posture. He called to his son for water and after drinking, died within three minutes. It was reported.
