**92 Years of Age But Drives Away Car Full of Bandits**



George M. Jackson, well known resident of Barrington township, routed three youthful bandits from his home Saturday with a 70 year old pistol which he used to carry as marshal of Barrington in the years following the Civil war.

The three youths, leaving two others in an automobile in front of the house approached the Jackson home. Mr. Jackson asked them what they wanted, but they did not answer and stalked into the house. He followed them into the building after asking what the ribs and commanded:

"Now you get out of here. This sun has never missed fire since 1860 and it is not likely to now, so you better get out quick." The three young fellows marched out and climbed into the car without saying a word. The five adventurers then drove off. Mr. Jackson notified his son Harvey and daughter Grace who were working in the barn.

On Sunday Mr. Jackson celebrated his ninety-second birthday with relatives at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Bertie Brandt in Barrington.

One of the bandits finally said: "You know you have money and we're going to find it."

The elderly man declared he did not have any money on the place. He said he kept his money in banks. They continued to search the house ignoring Mr. Jackson. Finally he sat down on a chair at the head of his bed as though he were dead. Reaching under the pillow he drew out the gun which he had there. Cocking it, he prodded the nearest robber in the ribs and commanded:
