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Checked Burr's Conspiracy

The first state to act in quelling Aaron Burr's conspiracy—even before the federal government itself—was Ohio. Without waiting for word from the national government, or instruction from any office of it, Gov. Edward Tiffin called the legislature into special session to promote the passage of "an act to prevent certain acts hostile to the peace and tranquility of the United States within the jurisdiction of this state." Acting promptly, Tiffin ordered the seizure of Burr's boats, provisions and ammunition, and one of the most notorious conspiracies in all history came to sudden grief.

Farm Bureau Gets Supply From Government for Chinch Bug Control Lake county farmers have been allotted 60 barrels of free federal creosote for emergency chinch bug control work in Lake county. The first 60 farmers to get their orders to the Farm Bureau office, Graylake, will be the lucky ones. In order to get this creosote they must agree to pick it up when it arrives, which will probably be the first part of the week of June 17, and use it according to the methods demonstrated at the chinch bug control demonstrations held in Lake county recently. Any farmer desiring to get a free drum of this material should get in touch with the Farm Bureau office immediately, as there will be only enough for the first 60 who get their orders.
