Bill Dreyer Wins 10,000 Meter Run at C.A.A.U. Meet

Finishes Almost Lap Ahead of Field in Race at Soldiers Field Sunday

Bill Dreyer, star local runner, added more laurels to his already imposing record when he won the 10,000 meter run at the Central A. A. U. championship track and field meet, held at Soldiers Field in Chicago Sunday. Dreyer, competing for Lincoln Park A. C., easily defeated a field of 15 runners, finishing almost a lap ahead of J. Bils, also of Lincoln Park A. C., who placed second. C. Wunder of South Parks placed third. The soft condition of the track was evidently responsible for Dreyer's slow time of 34 minutes

46 seconds as he has covered the distance much faster. On May 27 the Barrington runner won the Ogden Park 10,000 meter run in the record time of 30 minutes 24 seconds, more than four minutes faster than Sunday's race.

The South Park club captured the team championship of the thirty-third C.A.U. meet with 95 points followed by the Lincoln Park club with 37 points.
