## Few Centuries May Show Food Supply Inadequate

Limitation of life, in other words death, has naturally been much debated by scientists, and a result there has been suggested the thesis—pervasive extension of the theory of natural selection and survival of the fittest—that death was an adaptation advantageous to the race.

Death, which has thus been evolved in the process of advance from a protoplasm to the higher metazoan standard of existence, might be regarded as a provision against overpopulation and famine from insufficiency of the food supplies of the world, and so the natural counterpart to modern artificial birth control.

Miss Syme, professor of mathematics in Trinity college, Dublin, in the Seventeenth century, calculated that in the 1,400 years between the creation and the flood there would not have been standing room on the earth's surface if the breeding period of 400 years, beget a son every three years.

With the rapid increase of the world's population, due to improved sanitation, there have not been wanting estimations that, should no change occur, a few centuries would see the food supply of the world inadequate for its inhabitants—Cleveland Plain Dealer.

Months were spent by the stars in the remote interior of Mexico, they only means of communication with the outside world being by airplane.

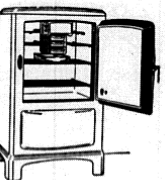

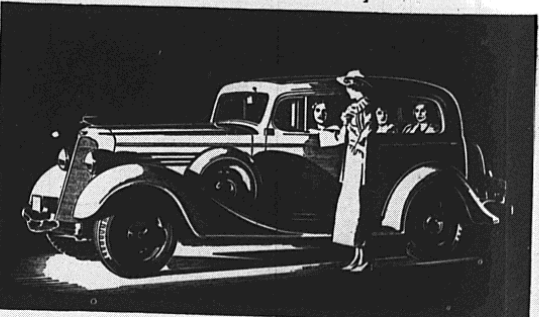
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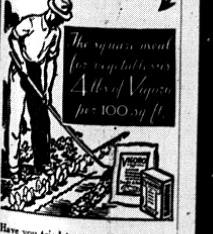
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
