Shinner's Market Remodeled at Cost of Almost \$3,000

Shinner's Market, newly remodeled and completely redecorated at a cost of between \$2,800 and \$3,000, will be open to the public Friday, with its official grand opening planned for Saturday. A corps of carpenters, electricians and painters has been busy all week remedying the damage of a fire which started in the cell block above a refrigerator on the first floor Sunday morning. The fire in ruined walls, ceilings, the storeroom and one room before it was put out. New improvements at the market include the lengthening of the front room one full counter height, the installation of a new refrigeration counter, rebuilding of the storeroom and redecoration of the entire store.

A color scheme of ivory, black and white has been carried out in the new decorations, walls and window trim done in ivory and white. Long painted black and white long mirrors now line the wall back of the new double-height refrigerated counters. Hinged partitions in the shop instead of cross-aisles, a new refrigeration counter had been formerly. A new black and white window sign completes the decorations in the front room.

Back of it is a rebuilt storeroom lined with varnished woodwork and kept at a constant temperature of 32 degrees. All goods in the ceiling of the former storeroom, now burned out, so new automatically controlled ones have been installed.

C. Roberts, Earl and Helen DeLong Graduates of N. U.

Charles J. Roberts of Maywood, one of the former Little Lines of Barrington and the late Dr. H. H. Roberts, was graduated from Northwestern University Medical School in Chicago Saturday afternoon. Charles graduated from Peoria township high school in 1926 and received his degree in liberal arts at Northwestern University in 1930. He has already begun his year of internship at Wesley hospital where his father served with high esteem for 31 years ago, and set recognition in his profession which nurse's training school his mother was graduated in 1933.

Mrs. Nellie Robertson of Cook County, Mrs. Viola Newton and Mrs. Jane and Donald, children of Mrs. Roberts, motored to Evanston to attend Charles' graduation. Dr. Harold L. Loken delivered a memorable address to the 1442 graduates on the economic relations of the present crisis.

Earl and Helen DeLong, former students of Barrington, were also among the graduates, both holding well earned memberships in Phi Kappa Phi and Phi Kappa Psi. Helen completed the course in science with high distinction and won the James scholarship. Earl received his master's degree in 1930 and his Ph.D. in Philosophy in 1932. The title of his thesis was "The Constitutional Basis of Law Enforcement." The DeLongs lived in Barrington about 15 years when Rev. DeLong was pastor of the Methodist church.

Mammoth Cave Discovered
by a Hunter in Year 1809

Mammoth Cave, the largest known cavern in the world, was discovered in 1809 by a Hunter, James H. Hatch, a writer in the Cleveland Plain Dealer. The cave is situated in Edmonson county, Kentucky, near Green river, about 125 miles southwest of Lexington. There are several streams in the cave, the principal one being Edna river, which is nearly three miles long and flows into the Green river. The cave is about 125 feet long, crossed by a remarkable natural bridge.

The cave avenues which extend for miles and great chambers spacious hallways, all of the halls of crystal and formation, stalagmites, stalactites, and with the cat-head and fountain from a most picturesque wonder.

Trip through the cave are arranged at certain hours from the entrance to the cave, organized by the State Park Commission. An entrance has a trip which includes a descent in September, 1921, it contains the most recent formations in Mammoth Cave.
