Cecil Paxton Official Representative of Ninth District "Legion Day"

Appropriation for Village Is \$43,185 Lowest Since 1927

Annual Ordinance Passed by Board of Trustees Monday Night

Anticipating lower costs for administering village affairs during the fiscal year beginning May 1, 1934, the board of trustees on Monday night passed an ordinance which called for a total maximum expenditure of \$43,185, the lowest since 1927. Five trustees voted against it. Trustee Blanke voted against it. Total appropriations for the last nine years follow: 1926 \$36,200; 1927 43,900; 1928 50,000; 1929 50,000; 1930 60,000; 1931 50,540; 1932 46,580; 1933 43,185.

\$60,000 Building Work Underway or Contemplated Here

Construction improvements for commercial and public buildings and village streets in Barrington costing no less than \$60,000 are either underway or will be started within a few weeks. These improvements include a new store building, the contemplated cost of which has not been announced, the school improvement plan was reduced from \$4500 to \$2500. The cost of holding municipal elections was cut from \$250 to \$150. Again, the use of the village hall will help reduce this expense through elimination of election hall rent. The anticipated expense of auditing the books was reduced from \$1000 to \$250. The item of street department equipment purchases was cut from \$300 to \$50. The road and bridge fund was reduced from \$4500 to \$2500. The amount of anticipated expense which were increased included the following: Insurance and indemnity including surety bonds, increased from \$1000 to \$1500; printing and publications increased from \$250 to \$350. Trustees Prohibit Soliciting Within Residence Section

Pass Two Ordinances; One Requires Peddlers Take Out Licenses

House to house soliciting in Barrington is hereafter prohibited and peddling without license is prohibited as the result of two ordinances passed at the regular meeting of the village board Monday night. The ordinance against soliciting declares that soliciting in the residential district constitutes a nuisance and directs the chief of police or person designated by the president of the board and village trustees to issue a citation or ordinance establishing a minimum fine of \$25 and a maximum of \$100 for conviction on each separate offense. The ordinance describes in part: "It is declared unlawful for any person, firm or corporation, acting in the village without license to solicit for or upon private property or residences in the village of Barrington, Cook and Lake counties, for the purpose of obtaining orders of purchase of obtaining orders of purchase of disposing of merchandise, unless such solicitor is licensed by the owner or occupant of such private residence, and the practice of going and upon private residences or property in the village without having been requested or invited so to do by the owner and occupant of such private residence is declared to be a nuisance and shall be punishable as a misdemeanor."

Fancy Diver Will Perform at Local Pool 3 P.M. Sunday

Public Exhibition to Be Held Each Week; 350 Swim Thursday

Frank Vock of Cary, fancy diver and expert swimmer from the University of Illinois, will give exhibitions and diving at the swimming pool every Sunday afternoon, at 3 p. m., starting July 1, according to Richard Dwyer, captain of the guards. He stated that the public was welcome to watch Mr. Vock's performance each week. There will be no charge. Thursday's heat was sent a maximum crowd to the swimming pool, more than 350 spectators for a dip before the lights were dimmed that evening. Genevieve Thacker, manager of the ticket department, reported. A week ago Tuesday, the attendance reached 325 but it was below the 200 mark since the time during the last two weeks. "Play day" was 16 county and one parochial school in dress and in dress. Public events at North Park athletic with a swim, 475 persons swam at the pool, but that figure did not include the large representative attendance, she said. A class of about 20 children from the North Park school in Barrington four mornings a week will be swimming lessons from Mary Edith Parke who instructs at the pool from 12 to 12 noon daily. Feed Costs Up, Lake County Farmers Will Ask \$2.58 for Milk

A fat rate of \$2.58 per hundred weight for whole milk was to be asked by farmers of Lake county meeting Thursday night at Gray's lake according to D. Kelley of Cuba township, P.M.A. official and chairman of the Lake county board of supervisors, who was instrumental in having the open meeting called. This is a higher price than farmers now receive for base, but the increase is asked because of the drought engendered depression. The farmers anticipate a scarcity of feed with resulting higher costs and stepped up cost of production. James McGraw, Andrew Grom and Mr. Kelsey attended a meeting of the Pure Milk association board of directors at Gray's lake Monday night. The meeting Thursday night was to be open to all dairy farmers regardless of whether they are members of the milk association or not.

Yacht Capsizes in Storm Saturday, Two Losing Lives

Violent wind and rain storms, plus lightning, caused the deaths of two Lake county residents and the destruction of a yacht.

Dieter Stables, near Mundelein, District 26, was the owner of the yacht. The yacht was destroyed by a violent wind and rain storm which ended a gay yacht party and threatened the lives of four other prominent young people of Waukegan. The yacht was capsized, a squall hurled all six passengers into the water. The others, William R. Talbot and Jack Balshaw, were hauled into rescue boats in a semi-conscious condition by volunteer workers but search for the missing members of the party was hampered by the storm and their bodies were not found until 7 a. m. Sunday when crews from Great Lakes Naval Training station was successful in dragging the bodies.

Lake Zurich Park District Plan Is Carried 80 to 78

Board Created by Vote of Citizens; Two Members of District Formed

Voters in favor of creating a park district at Lake Zurich by a narrow margin of two votes at the village elections held Tuesday, 80 votes being cast for creation of the district and 78 against it. At the same time, voters gave their support to the commissioners, the five receiving the highest total of votes to be members of the park district board. The following were elected by large majorities: Oscar Richter, Frank 21, Henry Branding, Lake Zurich is not a navigable lake and not a public body of water. It was reported that the owners have established a levy boat charge for boats floating on the water over their property. Eighty-two individuals own abutting property on this route. Most of them a small amount of lake bottom adjoining their shore property.

New Light Car Is Purchased for Use by Village Police

A new police car to be purchased from the Standard Motor Co. at a cost of \$429.43 plus the trade allowance of the old car, will be used by the police department. Purchase of the car was decided at a regular village meeting held Monday night. The board had bids of \$414 plus trade in allowance from the Ford Motor Co. and \$460 plus trade in allowance from the Hudson Essex Co. The trustees voted to lower the bid of the Standard Motor Co. and lowering will cost less than rebuilding. Another improvement contemplated by the board is installation of a partition between the treasurer's and clerk's office. This was turned over to the building committee for consideration. Mail Carrier 30 Years Retires; 2 Rural Routes Now

Sam Landwer is Pensioned; Carrier in Horse and Bugby Days

With the retirement on pension of Sam Landwer, United States mail carrier for 30 years, Barrington is losing a veteran carrier. He served for 17 years on two routes in place of three which formerly covered the territory. The routes will be divided as follows: Route 1 will include parts of the old routes 1 and 2 and will cover most of the Barrington territory north of the Chicago & North Western railroad. F. L. Bennett will carry on this route. Route 2 will include all of old route 3 and parts of old routes 1 and 2 and will cover the territory south of the C. & N.W. railroad and a small amount north of it between Hough street, highway 22, and the N.W. and the road extending north from Hobbs' crossing. C. L. Hutchinson is the carrier on this route. Each of the two consolidated routes is more than 50 miles in length. In eliminating a route after a carrier retires, the post office department is following an old custom in practice since the time when automobiles and motorcycles began to replace horses and buggies for transportation of rural mail. Postmaster E. J. Langender explained. When mailmen used horse and buggies, rural routes were much shorter than is necessary now when they can travel in automobiles. Following a larger number of routes and rural carriers were needed to serve the same territory. However, Uncle Sam did not permit the advent of automobiles (and in some cases motorcycles) to throw rural carriers out of employment, so the number of routes serving each territory was not decreased except by natural development. Usually when rural mail carriers resign, die, or retire after 25 years of service, successors are not appointed. Instead the routes are split up and added to each of the remaining routes. When horses and carriages were used in rural deliveries, Barrington had four rural routes. Beginning next Monday it will have two.

High Court Again Affirms Decree of Judge Shurtleff

Injunction Against Use of Creek for Sewer Outlet Is Upheld

Barrington is definitely and finally restrained by court decision from discharging the village's sewage into the Fox river. The supreme court of Illinois in rehearing of the case of the village of Barrington, plaintiff in error versus the Barrington Illinois Country club, et al, defendants in error, affirmed the original decision of Judge Edward D. Shurtleff which enjoined the village from emptying its sewage into the Fox river. The supreme court affirmed the original decision of Judge Shurtleff except that in the rehearing the court did not find the sanitary water board act unconstitutional. The court found that the sanitary water board has the power to protect public health and prohibit pollution of public waterways. The court agreed with Judge Shurtleff's finding that the Fox river is a public waterway and that the sanitary water board has no power to sanction the village's use of it for sewer outlet.
