Center of Earth Liquid
 The central portion of the earth is believed to be liquid, in the sense that it will transmit longitudinal earthquake waves, as any elastic liquid will, but will not transmit transverse earthquake waves, as it would do if it were solid. The pressure computed on the assumption of liquidity depends somewhat on the assumption made as to the distribution of density within the earth, but all reasonable assumptions give a pressure of over 40,000,000 pounds per square inch.

 sington on Hough street. Later, if traffic becomes heavy, an engineering route around the west edge of Barrington may be contemplated.

The route of the Barrington-Wauconda-Volo road, planned 15 years ago, a forerunner of route 59, was described as follows in the Barrington Review of September 4, 1919: "The road leading to Holzer's corner, then west to the White school, and then in a westerly direction to Peterson's corner and then to the Waunonda and then to the Wauconda-Woodstock road now under construction."

Changes Announced in Postal Service Effective August 1
 Two changes in postal service scheduled for August 1 will affect local patrons.

After that date postal money orders presented for payment at any post office other than the office designated on the order must be paid for at the rate charged at the original office of business, according to an announcement from Joe Robertson, assistant postmaster.

For example, if a money order is made out at St. Louis payable to someone in Barrington, the order can be cashed in Barrington without any fee charged to the receiver. If the receiver cashes the order while he is in Chicago, the Chicago post office will charge him a fee equal to the original fee paid by the sender at St. Louis. The fee charged will be the same at a bank or at a post office. Another change is the addition of a 10-cent fee charged for mailing registered mail to addressees only. If a registered letter is sent without the stamp mark, it may be delivered to any responsible party other than the addressee. However, if it is marked "addressee only" it will be delivered only to the party for whom intended.

"Bird Study Develops Patience and Open Mind"

The advantages of bird study were listed by Mrs. Charles Beerman of Harvey, speaker at a meeting of the Barrington Bird Club held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. William Pretzel of Lake Zurich Tuesday evening.

"Bird study develops patience, leads to open-mindedness, adds to the joy of living and provides an intensive and worthwhile hobby," the speaker said. She then described birds which the student in ornithology should know and discussed the status of bird study in public schools of Chicago. "Necessary equipment, necessarily obtained from interest in the subject," she stated, adding that well-stocked bookshelves and beautiful pictures inspire pupils to continue field work and individual studies of birds.

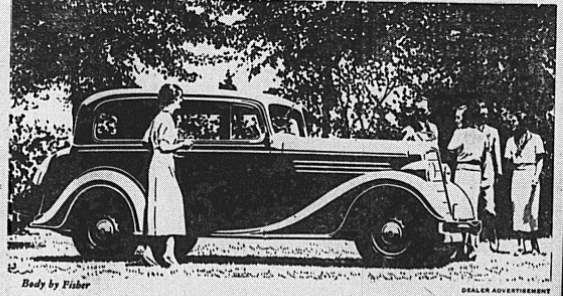
