"Brand-New" Before the streets of cities and towns were illuminated with lamps of electricity, it was customary for people to light their way at night by carrying burning torches, writes G. R. Turner in the Kansas City Times. In England these torches were termed "branda", from which we derived our modern word "fire-brand." To the people of those times the brand represented the sense of that which was bright or fiery. Thus, "brand-new" became, and has remained, a synonym for anything lustrous and bright with newness.

Lighting the U. S. Capitol Experiments in electric lighting in Washington began at the Capitol on November 20, 1878. The Forty-sixth congress appropriated \$2,000 to light the building with electricity. After many tests, lamps were installed October 4, 1878. Edison electric lights were inaugurated at thirteen street and Pennsylvania

avenue on October 15, 1881. From between Ninth and Fifteenth was lighted by electricity in 1882. It is true that the Capital was slow in installing electric street lights.

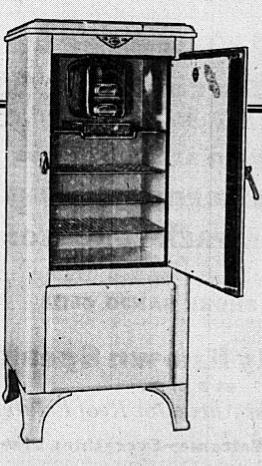
