McIntosh Sale a Success; 69 Pieces of Property Sold

Crowd Hears Lawrence Wood Discuss Future of Real Estate

With a large delegation of buyers from all parts of Chicago who came out by train, automobile and bus, the McIntosh & Co.'s first 1934 Barrington sale last Sunday proved an unexpected success. A total of 69 pieces of property was sold. The auctioneer was served by the company at 1 p. m. and an address at 2 p. m. by Lawrence Wood proved the high spot of the day. Wood, revealing facts about Chicago's future that held his audience for an hour, told of the tremendous building activity just ahead for this entire suburb and because of the federal housing act.

"The government," Mr. Wood said, "is not going into the building business but by insuring 80 per cent of the risk entailed by private capital, it has opened money gates that have been closed to building trades since the depression. Throughout the nation, banks, building and loan associations and other qualified organizations are ready to release a flood of money when the government machinery is ready to function. This will cause activity in real estate not seen since 1929."

William H. DePue, the McIntosh local manager was enthusiastic about Sunday's sale and said, "Those who bought got a bargain they never expected to see. Some times there were three and four buyers for each lot. We have not seen such interest since 1928. We Sunday we are going to offer some exceptional properties ready for building - close in. The sale will start at 2 p. m. and building lots will be served free at 1 p. m. at the big tent at Hillside avenue and Housh street in Barrington. You can drive right into the property. Mr. Wood will speak again."
