President of the league is Jouett Shouse, who was assistant secretary of the treasury under President Wilson. Other democrats on the executive committee include Alfred E. Smith of New York, democratic candidate for president in 1928, and John W. Davis, who opposed Calvin Coolidge in the presidential election in 1924.

Among republican members on the executive committee are Representative James W. Wadsworth of New York. Irene are Representative James W. Wadsworth of New York. Irene du Pont, who supported Alfred E. Smith and Franklin D. Roosevelt in their presidential campaigns, is also a member.

U. S. TAXES CLIMB

The speed with which billion-dollar appropriations be come new worries for the tax-burdened public was brought sharply to the front in the announcement by the department of internal revenue that its tax collections for the fiscal year just closed increased 65 per cent over those for the preceding

year.

Internal revenue taxes for last year totaled \$2,672,239. 000, compared with \$1,619,839,000 the preceding year, a gain of \$1,052,400,000 or 65 per cent, according to the official announcement. And collections for the fiscal year did not take into account the new funds that must be provided to meet the billions of dollars appropriated by congress during its last session, with increased taxes burdening recovery already.
