Village Sells at Loss to Heaviest Water Consumers

Shows Only 74 Per Cent of Water Pumped Through Meters

The water department is selling water at a loss to its large customers, although selling at a profit to the small consumers, according to a report compiled by A. L. Wad-block, village treasurer, at the request of the trustees and submitted to the board at the regular meeting Monday night. The report was for the fiscal year which ended April 30, 1934. It revealed that the nine largest water consumers, 44,300.00 gallons for which they were charged a total of \$1907.31 and which net the department \$6216.10 to pump and distribute with a resulting loss of \$1312.16. This loss was due to the fact that the minimum charge for large quantity users is 2.2 cents per thousand gallons, less than the cost of production. A waste of 26 per cent of all water pumped was also shown in the report. This, Mr. Wad-block explained at the board meeting, is a large amount compared to the percentage of water waste in other communities. The item "waste" is the difference between the amount pumped as shown by the meter less meters and the total amount recorded by consumers' meters throughout the village. It includes water used by the fire department, water used in flushing mains, water lost through leaks and water which gets through defective meters without being recorded.

The report stated in part: "The total water pumped was 10,000,000 gallons, and the total bill was \$0,950,000. The meter recorded amount was 7,500,000, thus showing 26 per cent of water pumped to be wasted. The total cost of operating the water department for the year ending April 30, 1934, was \$1,490,758 making the cost of the water billed 14.2 cents per thousand gallons. "All water billed on the 12th of the lowest rate for large quantity takes a loss of 2.2 cents per thousand gallons. This it follows that the more water used by the..."
