Village Sells at Loss to Heaviest Water Consumers

Shows Only 74 Per Cent of Water Pumped Through Meters

The village water department is selling water at a loss to the heaviest consumers, according to a report filed by A. L. Glick, treasurer, at the trustees and board of the village Monday night. The report was for the fiscal year ending April 30, 1934. It shows that the village pumped 14,200,000 gallons of water and which amounted to \$216,000 with a return of \$160,000. The difference of \$56,000 was the loss sustained by the village.

Workmen Busy at Final Touches on School Building

Plan to Hold "Open House" When Redecorating is Completed

Painters, carpenters and electricians are busy at Barrington public school this week finishing up work which could not be completed in the final rush prior to the opening of school. New electric closets and modern lighting fixtures have been ordered and as soon as everything is in readiness, the public will be invited to a school "open house" Sept. 22. A new suite of rearranged plans accepted by the IER this summer, is now completed except for lighting fixtures. All wood work is painted white, and the effect of matched wood is used throughout the room. The suite includes a supply room with numerous white shelves, general office and waiting room and a small private office for the superintendent, class-rooms, and office chairs, and telephone. Several of the school rooms have new closets and additional lockers. Redecorating has been general throughout the building and floors will be varnished when everything else is finished. New lockers installed in a separate building are now in working order and the former locker building is being remodeled to a school room for manual training and mechanical drawing. Roofing repairs will complete the work undertaken by this group.
