400 at Community Service Honoring American Legion

Discussing the preamble to the American Legion constitution as an indication of the Legion's attitude toward matters both governmental and spiritual, Rev. Joseph Hervey of Belmont post 597 A.L.G. gave the Armistice Day address at a community program in the public school auditorium Sunday evening.

"When the war was over and ex-service men were free to go to their homes, they decided to band together for further service to their country and to God," declared the speaker.

The program was arranged by the Legion with the cooperation of Salem, St. Paul, Baptist, Methodist and Catholic churches, the Legion Auxiliary, Woman's Relief corps, girl scouts, boy scouts, cub and campfire girls.
