

Rites Saturday for Mrs. K. Dvorak, 94 Year Old Pioneer

Was Oldest Resident of Fox River Grove; Had Been in Only 3 Days

Mrs. Katherine Dvorak, oldest resident of Fox River Grove, died at the age of 94 years Wednesday, Nov. 7, after having been ill only three days.

Funeral services were held at her late home and from S.S. Peter and Paul's church, Cary, Saturday afternoon, Nov. 10, at 2 o'clock in St. John's cemetery with Rev. F. Kelly officiating.

Mrs. Dvorak was born in Valenka, Czechoslovakia in 1840 and was married to William Dvorak of Svaty Czechoslovakia at an early age. The couple decided to try the country of promise and emigrated to America, landing in New York City. They lived in New York for 24 years and in 1912 moved to Chicago where they resided for 2 years. They then purchased the farm here on which Mrs. Dvorak spent the last sixty years of her life.

At that time there was no bridge for traffic over Fox River so the road that is now Cary road went no further towards Cary than the railroad crossing and thence to Algonquin. This crossing became known as Dvorak crossing, the first name on the location that now comprises part of the Grove.

Mrs. Dvorak lived to see her farm completely within the village and chosen as a desirable location for the village hall, First State bank, several prosperous business houses and some fine residences. She possessed the use of all her faculties and retained a sound memory through the years. She liked to relate incidents of Chicago after the fire and meeting Indians some 60 years ago. She enjoyed good health and was sick only three days preceding her death.

She was one of those of the past generation who worked for a better community and made the world a better place because they had lived.

She was the mother of seven children—her husband and four of her children preceded her in death. Those surviving are John Dvorak and Mrs. William McGraw of Fox River Grove and William Dvorak of Chicago. There are 22 grandchildren and 26 great grandchildren.

Levon of this district speaker of the day, gave an inspiring address to the hundreds who braved the cold and wind to attend and have a part in this service.

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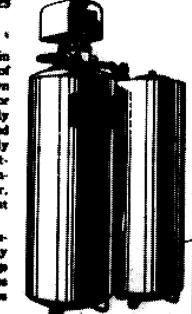
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
